1. **Welcome and Introductions.** Chair Rob Riley called the meeting to order at 9 a.m. Attendees introduced themselves. Thea Walsh introduced new Transportation Systems & Funding team member Nathan Shay.
2. **Approval of May 4, 2016 Minutes.** Reynaldo Stargell moved to approve the May 4, 2016 minutes, and Bill Ferrigno seconded. The motion carried.
3. **Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) Report.** Walsh announced that the Commuter Challenge began today and encouraged people to sign up for it. TRAC is accepting 2016 funding applications for major/new projects over \$12 million through the end of June.
 - **Transit Agency Reports**
 - **COTA.** Elliott Doza reported that COTA is signing the CMAX grant agreement with FTA today. COTA plans to begin ground-breaking soon. COTA also launched its real-time transit app, developed by a third party. It includes other modal options such as Car2Go, CoGo and Uber. AirConnect launched at the beginning at May, COTA's bus

service to and from the airport. He said that there is a ticket vending machine at the airport. COTA's long-range transit plan has been updated and is available on the website.

- DATABus. Denny Schooley announced that tomorrow a public hearing will be held on upcoming service changes. DATABus will also discuss its Transit Development Plan. It has also launched its mobility management website - Delawaremobility.com. It lists local providers and agencies to help with transportation. Unfortunately, Delaware County does not have many transportation options. DATABus also applied for a wellness grant to make sure transportation is not a barrier for people trying to get to medical appointments.
- Air Quality Update. Ebert said that the Sustainability Advisory Committee's Energy and Air Quality Working Group voted unanimously to comment on Ohio EPA's redesignation request for the 2008 8-hour ozone standard from marginal non-attainment to attainment. The EPA has this redesignation package out for public comment until June 2nd. The redesignation request is available on Ohio EPA's website, and Ebert distributed a copy of the request. She said that the letter is consistent with MORPC's regional sustainability agenda and its public policy agenda. The letter will be presented to MORPC's Executive Committee with feedback to submit to Ohio EPA in time for its hearing on June 2nd. Ebert asked for any feedback to be submitted to her by close of business tomorrow. Ira Weiss asked if this letter incorporated the changes made by the working group last week, and Ebert said that it did. Joel Spokas asked what the regional impact will be to go from marginal non-attainment to attainment. Ebert explained that in the long term, attainment and non-attainment affect our federal funding stream. She said that if we are identified as non-attainment we would have three years to put together a State Implementation Plan (SIP) to bring the region into attainment.

Ferrigno asked if this affects funding. Ebert replied that we want the record to show that for the last three years that the region was in attainment. We want to show that we are making steady progress toward cleaner air in the region. Walsh added that this will not change our available funding. It would only affect us if we were not trying to achieve attainment.

4. Funding Programs.

- Proposed Resolution T-10-16: "AMENDING THE STATE FISCAL YEAR (SFY) 2016-2019 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM INCLUDING CHANGES TO FEDERAL TRANSIT ADMINISTRATION'S (FTA'S) SECTION 307 PROGRAM OF PROJECTS." Nathaniel Vogt said that this is our quarterly TIP amendment. He highlighted the MORPC programs included in the amendment:
 - Adding insight2050 Phase III to the TIP
 - Air Quality Awareness - adjusting funding
 - Ride Solutions - adjusting funding

Two COTA projects are included that make minor adjustments to the Section 5307 funding in future years.

Ted Beidler moved to accept Resolution T-10-16, and Schooley seconded. The motion carried.

- Project Status Update. Vogt noted that not many encumbrances were received over the past month. We have encumbered enough to be below the limits in ODOT's carryover policy. Sunbury Road's right-of-way of \$800,000 was authorized in September; however,

it has not yet been encumbered. Also, the right-of-way certification for that project has been delayed a couple of months from April to June. The environmental document for Pickerington's Refugee Road widening project was scheduled for today, but it was delayed until late in August. The Stage 2 cost estimate plans came in, and the estimate would increase the STP portion by \$220,000.

Vogt said that the on-line application form should be posted on our website by the end of the week. We will extend the deadlines by two to three weeks.

5. Informational Items:

- Rural Transportation Planning Organization (RTPO). Walsh updated the committee on this organization. She explained that we are working to organize the RTPO with the seven counties that surround the MPO: Knox, Morrow, Marion, Union, Madison, Pickaway and Fairfield. They will not be members of our MPO, but stand alone as an organization. The RTPO will engage together in transportation planning. We are looking for support from ODOT. We met with all seven counties at the beginning of May to discuss the terms by which they would come together. Last week we sent out a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to the county commissioners from all seven counties for their signatures. The RTPO will be known as the Central Ohio Rural Transportation Planning Organization. MORPC has been working on this for the past year. The RTPO's funding from ODOT will be separate from that for the MPO.

Schooley asked the purpose of the RTPO. Walsh explained that the purpose is to do the transportation planning work that is done in the MPO outside the MPO. This is an opportunity for us to do the planning in the counties around the MPO. They currently have no access to our funds; nor do they have any long-range transportation plans.

- National Highway System. Maria Schaper made a presentation on this subject. Her PowerPoint presentation is available at:

Doza asked how restrictive the design standards are. Nick Gill said there are not significantly different standards from regularly transportation-funded projects. At least one lane of a minimum lane width is one standard for non freeways. The roadside barrier is another one for. Nancy Reger asked why there is a designation for these particular routes. She wanted to know if this was for national defense. Gill said that the NHS network of roadways important to the nation's economy, defense, mobility was designated in SAFETEA-LU. Gill added that the performance measurement aspect national rules are slowly being promulgated. Most of these measurements apply to the NHS system. Riley said that it used to be that there were no rural principal arterials that was not a state route. Schaper said that in the recent update, urban and rural designations were removed and this is no longer the case.

- Homes on the Hill. Nancy Reger made a presentation on this subject. Her PowerPoint presentation is available at:

Riley asked how the crime data were determined. Reger said that it came from public safety personnel.

6. **Other Business.** Walsh let everyone know that they could pick up a new bike map on the way out. She said there is also an on-line version. Riley reported that Sonja Simpson is the new district director at ODOT District 5, and Jack Marchbanks is the new district director at District 6. Riley adjourned the meeting at 9:54 a.m.

MORPC Monthly Metropolitan Transportation Organization Summary

June 2016

Transportation Systems & Funding

- **Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP)**
The 2016-2040 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) Public Involvement Appendix was finalized. The 2016-2040 MTP was approved by FHWA and ODOT. Copies of the final 2016-2040 MTP and its appendices will be sent to the reference departments of major libraries in the transportation planning area. The full plan is available on MORPC's website.
- **Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS)**
The U.S Department of Transportation announced Columbus as the winner of the \$40 million Smart Cities Challenge.
- **Transit/Human Services**
Staff participated in meetings with Groveport, Obetz , Mt. Carmel in Grove City, and Grove City staff regarding workforce mobility and transit service.
- **DATABus**
The Delaware Gazette featured an article on DATABus's public hearing on the draft Transit Development Plan and Funding Study.
- **RideSolutions**
MORPC hosted an OARC event, "Planning the Future of Transportation Demand Management in Ohio" for OARC's Rideshare and Air Quality subcommittee. The keynote speaker was John Martin, President and CEO of the Southeastern Institute of Research, Inc. (SIR). There was a discussion lead by Mike Norvell from SIR, followed by stakeholder input for the subcommittees' TDM advancement and rideshare technology platform development.
- **Infrastructure Funding**
Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)
The online application and update forms for local agencies seeking to apply for or maintain MORPC-attributable funding process opened in early June. Updates to previous funding commitments were received through June 24th. Requests for new funding were received through July 1st.

TIP staff attended the June Project Status Meeting at ODOT District 6 to monitor project progress. Staff also attended the kick-off meeting for the Columbus Traffic Signals System, Phase E project and Columbus's South Hamilton Road project in the Eastland area. Other

project development activities included:

- Review of the feasibility study for Columbus' Refugee Road from Winchester Pike to Hamilton Road sidewalk and multi-use path project.
- Review of Stage 2 plans for Pickerington's Refugee Road from Wheatfield to Woodstock major widening project.
- Review of the feasibility study and Stage 1 plans for Dublin's Tuttle Crossing Boulevard Extension project.
- Participation in a meeting to discuss Worthington's Worthington-Galena/Wilson Bridge/Huntley project (now known as the Northeast Gateway) with the City of Worthington, ODOT D6 staff, and consultants.
- Review of Stage 3 plans for Columbus' Polaris Parkway major widening project.

Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC)

MORPC signed a contract with the Ohio Public Works Commission to receive \$15,000 from the Clean Ohio Conservation Fund to cover administrative costs involved with administering this program in Franklin County (District3).

The Natural Resources Assistance Council (NRAC) met to review and approve criteria and policies for Round 11. Round 11 preliminary applications for the Clean Ohio Conservation Fund program will be due on December 30, 2016, with final applications due on March 17, 2017. District 3 has an allocation of \$3,129,078. The NRAC is finalizing the design guidelines for Clean Ohio signage that must be erected at project sites that received Clean Ohio funds. One Round 10 project (Appalachia Ohio Alliance - Hancock Farm Conservation) withdrew, allowing the NRAC to award \$345,000 in additional funding to the Franklin County Big Walnut Creek Parkland Preservation project to purchase 17 more acres. The Westerville Spring Run Restoration project was also awarded \$412,050. At the end of Round 10, the NRAC will have \$1,018,223 in unspent funding to add to the Round 11 allocation.

Transportation Review Advisory Council (TRAC)

The application deadline for the 2016 TRAC cycle was June 30, 2016. MORPC submitted emails acknowledging the applications to the applicants, as required by the TRAC application process. ODOT staff will review and score all applications received over the summer, with public hearings scheduled in October.

- Regional Data Lab
The membership of the Regional Data Advisory Committee is established and the first Regional Data Advisory Committee meeting has been scheduled for July 21st.
- New Data & Mapping Team Members
Data & Mapping welcomed two new interns in June. Alex Jokerst, a senior at OSU is the new Data Management intern, and Seth Tribby, a junior at OSU is the new GIS intern.
- New Interactive Maps
 - The updated version of the Bike User interactive web map went live.
 - Freight Story Map

- Participation at Conferences and Meetings
 - Intelligent Communities Forum (ICF) Summit – Urban Master Class
 - 2016 Esri (GIS) International User Conference
 - Presentation of the Active Transportation Plan at the URISA GIS and Health Symposium in Washington, D.C.

- Regional Involvement
 - MORPC has been chosen as the test MPO to implement Safety Analyst because of the quality of its transportation data files.
 - Continue to provide data management support to the MPO Attributable Funds program.
 - Participation in the Franklin County 911 Planning Committee and Technical Advisory Committee meeting.
 - Bikeways are now available for editing by communities participating in the cooperative regional GIS system that also includes sidewalks, roads, and addresses.
 - MORPC staff conducted training on using the new interactive map and the accompanying indexing tool developed for Homes on the Hill, a CDC located on the west side of Franklin County.
 - A draft of the activity and vitality index analysis, including maps and peer community profile, was presented at the insight2050 Executive Committee meeting.

- Support for Members
 - Prepared a Buckeye Hills area map made for Perry County Gateway project, for presentation to governor's office.
 - Supplied Active Transportation and MTP GIS data to Delaware County Regional Planning Commission.
 - Provided traffic count and road data to OSU's Center for Urban & Regional Analysis.
 - Supplied population forecast data to the Pataskala YMCA.
 - Provided population forecast data to the Columbus Compact.

Planning and Environment

- Active Transportation Planning

Meetings: Staff participated in this year's OSU Summer Youth Program and presented about MORPC, general planning principles, and tactical urbanism approaches.

Staff participated in the Ohio Bicycle Federation Conference Call. During the call, current initiatives related to advancing bicycling in the state were discussed, along with current policy efforts.

Staff participated in the Statewide Active Transportation Team Conference call. During this call, the steering committee discussed the progress that had been made on the plan's strategies and outlined next steps for participants. MORPC's main contribution to that team is related to non-motorized data collection and safety data support.

- Transportation Safety

Meetings: Staff attended the Safe Communities General Body Coalition Meeting. During this meeting Columbus Public Health discussed current transportation safety educational initiatives, including Click-It-Or-Ticket and motorcycle safety.

- insight2050
insight2050 Communications Tools:
Staff worked with its web design team at Madison & Fifth to create an insight2050 Case Study website and Resource Library. The Case Study website hosts examples of developments that demonstrate connection to the findings of insight2050. The Resource Library provides tools, data, photos and best practices primarily for use by local governments and the real estate development community. The websites were presented to the insight2050 Executive Committee.

Murphy Epson presented its draft communications/outreach plan to the Communications Committee. This plan will be the framework for a resident engagement toolkit designed to assist local governments and the real estate development community to facilitate conversations with Central Ohio residents.

Meetings and Related Training: Staff hosted the insight2050 Executive Committee for its 2nd quarter meeting. Agenda items included an update on Phase II tool development (outreach, case study website, resource library, mapping tools) and an introduction to Phase III: MORPC Local Technical Assistance Program.

Staff attended the Franklin County Retail Summit hosted by the Columbus Chamber and Franklin County. Keynote speaker Yaromir Steiner, insight2050 Executive Committee Chair, addressed the impacts of Central Ohio's population growth and changing demographics on retail to the 400-person audience.

Staff attended "Golf & Gigabits at the Memorial Tournament," hosted by City of Dublin. Discussion focused on the city's regional approach to business and community development with topics including Connected Vehicles research and Smart Cities Challenge; Dublin 100 gig Transport network; and the Intelligent Communities Forum Institute.

Staff attended Best Social Media Practices for Local Government to learn about novel approaches to resident engagement.

Outreach: insight2050 was presented to the Columbus Green Team (approximate audience of 25); to The Ohio State University Conservation Planning Class (approximate audience of 30); and the Clintonville Rotary Organization (approximate audience of 15).

- Age-Friendly Columbus
Staff presented Age-Friendly Columbus to the Chronic Disease Prevention Advisory Board meeting. The presentation relates to the Board's focus areas of active living, clean air, and healthy eating.

Staff attended the Health Map 2016 CMC luncheon to hear about the highest health risk factors in older adult populations, and how medical providers and institutions want to assist them.

The Age-Friendly Columbus Advisory Council met for the second time. Staff updated its members on the progress of the project and next steps. A major point of discussion was the assessment (data collection, site assessments, and older adults' preference survey) and pilot neighborhoods.

Team members participated in the AARP-facilitated Age-Friendly peer exchange in Denver, Colorado where they shared best practices with other age-friendly communities and both Regional and Metropolitan Planning Organizations.

- **Greenways & Water Quality Program**
Central Ohio Greenways (COG) Board: The COG Trail Development Working Team met to discuss the draft design guidelines document template and to review the draft maps produced through meetings with jurisdictions in each Franklin County quadrant.

Water Quality Working Group Review Committee: Staff facilitated the fourth meeting of the Water Quality Working Group Review Committee. The Committee prioritized issues for its working group to address and discussed vision and mission statements.

Water Quality Working Group: Staff facilitated the Water Quality Working Group. Updates were given to the group on policy, the Review Committee, and Riverfest. Other topics included the William C. Habig Collaborative Achievement Award, and developing a water resources session for the Summit on Sustainability.

Riverfest: Riverfest was a success with over 160 people on the water kayaking and canoeing. Riverfest partnered with the Columbus Arts Festival.

Meetings: Staff attended the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) meeting at the Franklin County Engineer's Office. The meeting focused on updating Franklin County's Stormwater Management Plan and the roles for everyone at the meeting. MORPC will review the plan.

Staff presented to elementary school teachers who are participating in the Metro Parks Summer Teach Program. The presentation was focused on how MORPC serves the region with regard to all of our areas of focus: transportation, water, development, energy, air quality, local foods, public policy, etc. Other organizations were also present, including, but not limited to, SWACO, soil and water conservation districts, and Metro Parks.

- **Summit on Sustainability**
The Summit on Sustainability will take place on October 21st at the Hilton Downtown. Its theme, as approved by the Sustainability Advisory Committee, is "Feeding our Economy." Staff is currently discussing ideas for the breakfast keynote & panel discussion as well as organizing the various breakout sessions.
- **Green Pact**
Team members facilitated the Central Ohio Green Pact where they shared updates on their sustainability efforts and toured the City of Columbus Fleet Management Facility.

Energy & Air Quality

- **Air Quality**
MORPC issued an Air Quality Alert on June 20th for Central Ohio. The AQI was forecasted to reach 105. The alert received coverage in *The Columbus Dispatch* and a segment on air pollution on ABC6.

The Air Quality staff entered into a contract with Sinclair Media Group/ABC6 for a comprehensive marketing package for an air quality awareness campaign. The campaign began in June and extends through the summer months. The campaign will help in the promotion of air quality alert email signups, public information about what to do in the event of an alert, and how to reduce individual contributions to air pollution. The package will provide video public service announcements, social media promotion, email marketing, display advertising, and two morning show appearances as elements of the package. The firm has guaranteed 150,000 household impressions for the PSAs, and 150,000 emails deployed for the email campaign.

MORPC Air Quality and the Transportation Demand Management team continue to work on the Commuter Challenge campaign, which kicked off June 1st and goes through June 30th. The Commuter Challenge is in partnership with CoGo, COTA, and car2go. Central Ohioans are encouraged to replace any single-occupant vehicle commutes with one of the eligible sustainable modes (carpool, vanpool, bike, bus, walking, carshare). When commuters log these sustainable commutes at www.makeyourmilesmatter.com, they become eligible for daily prizes and grand prizes at the conclusion of the contest. As of June 20th, 540 people had participated, reducing Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) in the region by 46,164, and reducing greenhouse gas emissions by 35,823 lbs. in the region.

On June 20th, ABC6 included an interview segment with MORPC staff about the Commuter Challenge on its morning show "Good Day Marketplace." On June 28th, the Air Quality Program supervisor will appear on "Good Day Marketplace" to promote air quality awareness and encourage Central Ohioans to sign up to receive Air Quality Alerts. The Commuter Challenge was also included in the June 20th article in *The Columbus Dispatch*. A wrap-up event is planned for July 6th at noon at Columbus Commons, where grand prize winners will be announced. Free ice cream will be provided by Jeni's Splendid Ice Creams for the first 100 visitors.

On March 21, 2012 U.S. EPA designated nonattainment areas for the 2008 eight-hour ozone standard. The counties of Delaware, Fairfield, Franklin, Knox, Licking and Madison were designated nonattainment for the Columbus area. Air quality monitoring data collected between 2012 and 2014 in the region demonstrated attainment of the NAAQS. Energy & Air Quality Working Group members provided feedback on a draft comment letter by MORPC in support of the draft redesignation of the Columbus Region to attainment for ozone pollution for the 2008 eight-hour standard for ozone. The draft letter was also presented to the Sustainability Advisory Committee, Community Advisory Committee, Transportation Advisory Committee, and Executive Committee for input. MORPC submitted comments to Ohio EPA on June 2nd.
