Safe Routes to School National Conference in Columbus, April 5-7 Intersections – Where Health and Transportation Meet

(COLUMBUS, March 29, 2016) — Whether using feet or wheels, hundreds of attendees are converging in Columbus on April 5-7 to learn about improving connections for people and the "intersections" of health and transportation at the fifth Safe Routes to School National Conference. It is being held at the Hilton Downtown Columbus, 401 North High Street, Columbus, 0H 43215.

The three-day conference features dynamic keynote speakers, hands-on mobile workshops and more than 30 breakout sessions with six tracks — equity, health, partnerships, policy, safety and sustainability — to engage and educate attendees.

"We are delighted to celebrate Safe Routes' 10th anniversary at the conference and to showcase a decade of progress making it safer for school children to walk and bicycle to school," said Safe Routes to School National Partnership Executive Director Cass Isidro.

"We know the importance of sharing great ideas and best practices, and the National Conference is a golden opportunity to do so in-person. There are exciting 'intersections' throughout the conference for attendees and the opportunity to earn professional development credits while finding out about practical, proven hands-on ways to make it safer for walking and bicycling to school," said National Center for Safe Routes to School Director Nancy Pullen-Seufert.

Nationwide is the conference's Program Sponsor.

"We are excited to show the rest of the country what our local governments and schools in the Columbus region and Ohio are doing to make it safer to walk and bicycle to school as the host of the Safe Routes to School National Conference," said Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission (MORPC) Executive Director and Conference Host William Murdock.

The conference kicks off on Tuesday, April 5, at noon, with keynote speaker Kevin Carroll, founder of Kevin Carroll Katalyst/LLC. He is the author of three highly successful books, *Rules of the Red Rubber Ball, What's Your Red Rubber Ball?!* and *The Red Rubber Ball at Work*.

Tuesday afternoon's mobile workshop is a "How We Roll" ride around downtown and nearby neighborhoods led by local bike advocacy group Yay Bikes!

The National Center for Safe Routes to School will announce the winner of its Oberstar Award and the Safe Routes to School National Partnership will present its inaugural Hubsmith Award at the conference.

"Safety is our top priority. Ohio has one of the most dynamic Safe Routes to School programs in the country and we are thrilled to be able to showcase our many innovations and cutting edge programming to the nation," said Ohio Department of Transportation Director Jerry Wray.

The conference's second day, Wednesday, April 6, is full of breakout sessions, mobile workshops and keynote presentations. The morning begins with remarks by Gil (Guillermo) Penalosa, Founder & Chair of the Board, 8 80 Cities from 8-9:30am.

Wednesday's lunch speakers, at noon, will discuss the intersections between health and transportation. Columbus-based physicians Ihuoma Eneli, Director, Nationwide Children's Hospital Center for Healthy Weight and Nutrition; and Mike Patrick, Assistant Professor of Clinical Pediatrics at The Ohio State University College of Medicine and Medical Director of Interactive Media for Nationwide Children's Hospital; will be joined by Jennifer Toole, Founder and President of Toole Design Group.

- Blind Walk Audits, where participants will walk around downtown while blindfolded with guide dogs or white canes
- Bike Co-Op Field Trip to Franklinton Cycle Works with a basic bike mechanics class.

"Intersections" continues on Thursday, April 7 with breakout sessions and a luncheon featuring TED-style talks by local Safe Routes to School advocates and participants from 11:30am–1pm.
