DRIVE INVESTMENT

RAPID 5

RAPID 5 was launched early May with the announcement that Dr. Amy Acton is the CEO & President for the organization. Over the next few months, RAPID 5 will continue to evolve as its own nonprofit and will host listening sessions in the community. MORPC's main contact for the RAPID 5 initiative is Chief Regional Strategy Officer Kerstin Carr. The updated website is available at https://www.rapid5.org/.

Amtrak Fact Finding Trip

In response to the Federal Rail Agency releasing guidance on new corridors to expand or improve service, MORPC leaders and Vice Chair Chris Amorose Groomes participated in a fact-finding trip with Michigan legislators and Amtrak leaders. Team Members traveled from the East Lansing Gateway Transportation Center to Chicago aboard Amtrak's *Blue Water* train. While aboard, they experienced the track and infrastructure upgrades on the routes Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) contracts with Amtrak to operate. Since 1974, Michigan has been a partner with Amtrak and the Federal government to expand and improve passenger rail services connecting their state with the national rail network. MDOT, Amtrak and other Michigan railroads were available on the trip to answer questions about Michigan's rail programs.

Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy

Team Members continue to monitor the distress statuses of the eleven counties of the Columbus region. Staff is preparing presentations regarding economic development district designation that will also serve as a CEDS progress update for the eleven counties. Team Members will visit each county during June/July to give the presentations.

Brownfield Assessments

MORPC continues to make great progress on its brownfield projects and is looking forward to the upcoming release of brownfield funding in the fall.

- Cooper's Glass Field, in the City of Chillicothe, is preparing for a Phase II environmental site
 assessment (ESA), with field work beginning in June. The Sampling and Analysis Plan was
 submitted to the EPA.
- A Phase I ESA was completed for the City of Logan City Dump property. MORPC supported the City
 by providing the site's Phase 1 report, as the City works to secure funding for future phases of the
 brownfield site's work.
- MORPC worked with the City of Bexley to discuss a potential brownfield project. Due to most of the
 grant already being allocated, it is possible that MORPC's role will be as an informational or advisory
 resource depending on the City's needs. Team Members will work to determine if the project could
 be included in upcoming brownfield funding opportunities.

DC Flv-In

On May 10th MORPC Team Members helped lead a delegation of the Central Ohio Defense Group in six meetings on Capitol Hill. MORPC shared how the agency is seeking to create an Intergovernmental Support

Agreement (IGSA) that allows for sole-source partnerships between MORPC and Rickenbacker. This would eliminate much of the overhead artificially created under traditional Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) and create a new revenue source for our local governments.

Central Ohio Defense Group

The Central Ohio Defense Group met May 6. A central focus of the meetings was the promotion of The National Guard Association of the US conference that is **August 26-29** at the Greater Columbus Convention Center. More than 5,000 members of the military, national Administration officials, elected officials and private industry representatives who are members, partners and supporters of the National Guard will attend. Attendees will be from all 54 States and Territories. The event is a major gathering of industry and military decision makers who evaluate, assess, recommend, and select equipment, machinery, supplies and services for the over 450,000 members of the Army and Air National Guard.

Metropolitan Transportation Plan

Team Members continue to collect, compile, develop, and seek review on data and information as part of the 2050 population and employment forecasts. Staff is reviewing the regional goals that will guide development of the 2024-2050 MTP. A draft of existing land use and future land use at the parcel level is out for community review via a web map.

Data development continues for the 2022 MTP Report Card. Team Members established a timeline for the forthcoming proposed amendment to the 2020-2050 MTP to incorporate Intel development-related infrastructure improvements.

US 23 Connect Study

After comparison of the expected benefits and costs for each concept, ODOT determined that none of the concepts can be reasonably implemented as presented in the study. Therefore, ODOT will not advance any of the study concepts. In the coming months, ODOT will reach out to stakeholders to discuss transportation concerns and priorities along the existing U.S. 23 corridor in more detail. Through this shift in focus, ODOT will prioritize the needs of the existing U.S. 23 corridor and develop individual projects, providing drivers with real benefits sooner rather than later. Moving forward, the public will continue to be engaged for input and ideas for how to solve some of these problems.

Transportation Review Advisory Council

The 2022 application period for Major New Capacity Program funding through TRAC closed May 31. MORPC will produce summaries of each application from the MPO area and present more information about the regional prioritization process and public comment period at the CAC, TAC, and Transportation Policy Committee meetings in June.

LinkUs Mobility Initiative

Team Members continue to work with COTA on regional outreach about the LinkUS funding and implementation plan. Staff are engaged in ongoing committee and working group meetings including developing goals, metrics, and targets. MORPC began coordinating with COTA to engage region-wide partners in establishing a committee for the potential development of a regional Transit Supportive Infrastructure CIP.

Interregional Connections Committee

Team Members monitored the FRA Corridor Identification program for introduction of passenger rail to the 3C+D corridor. The May committee meeting focused on the downtown passenger rail feasibility and design study by the Franklin County Convention Facilities Authority.

FTA Section 5310 Designated Recipient

Team Members finalized the FY 2021 Section 5310 grant cycle. Contract execution is the next step. MORPC accepted three Section 5310 vehicles in April and May. Two additional cutaway vehicles are anticipated for delivery in 2022 if the supply chain returns to normal.

CORPO

CORPO met May 2 and adopted the FY23 Planning Work Program and the 2023-2050 CORPO Transportation Plan Goals and Objectives.

MORPC Attributable Funding

MORPC is soliciting applications for new funding commitments, as well as outstanding commitment updates. Screening applications for new funding commitments are due July 15 while commitment updates are due July 8.

Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC)

On May 14 the Public Works Integrating Committee (PWIC) for OPWC District 3 in Franklin County, approved on several revisions to the policies and criteria for FY23 funding. The policies and criteria in the Applicant Manual were sent to OPWC for review and approval. After OPWC approval, the application material will be posted on MORPC's website and the call for applications will be released.

Clean Ohio Conservation Fund

Four projects were awarded over \$3,000,000 in Clean Ohio Conservation Funds. Preliminary Screeners for the next funding round are due December 9. A workshop introducing new applicants to the process will be offered in the future. For more information, please contact Edwina Teye at eteye@morpc.org.

Local Government Summer Internship Program

Team Members hosted the 2022 Local Government Summer Intern Program and Orientation. This year's class of more than 30 interns represents eight different colleges and universities. Team Members led MORPC mentor training. A fourth Easton Future Vision Fellow was hired, and one host is seeking approval from their Council to hire a third intern.

Public Involvement & Engagement

Team Members participated in the Franklin County Affordable Housing Fair and provided information about MORPC's home repair, weatherization, air quality, and Gohio programs, collecting home repair and weatherization applications from attendees onsite at the event.

CREATE AN ENVIRONMENT FOR PROSPERITY

Transportation Safety

Team Members are reaching out to safety partners throughout the MPO to set up meetings to discuss potential applications for the Safe Streets and Roads for All grants.

Regional Housing Strategy (RHS)

Team Members provided an overview of the RHS at a community conversation about diverse and inclusive housing policies hosted by the Grandview Anti-Racism & Inclusion Network.

MORPC members can look forward to an improved and expanded RHS Resource Hub in 2022. Resources will include examples of administrative and policy best practices, templates, and data, and will promote the efforts of MORPC members and partners to advance the goals of the RHS. If your community or organization would like to share resources for inclusion in the Resource Hub, please contact us.

Technical Assistance Program

Work is well underway with the four communities that received technical assistance awards. MORPC led the first stakeholder workshop with the City of Columbus and key stakeholders to discuss opportunities to better connect downtown and the Near East Side with the regional trail system. MORPC has also been coordinating key stakeholder and landowner meetings to discuss the feasibility of various alignments for the extension of the Scioto Trail southward. Work on these efforts will continue through the summer and into fall.

Mobility Management

MORPC hosted the coordination meeting for ODOT Human Services Transportation Coordination Region 6. The meeting focused on benchmarking for the regional coordinated plan and collaboration for human service transportation work.

Team Members continue to work on Gohio Mobility, the statewide specialized transportation search tool. Staff is assisting statewide mobility management in their drawing of service area for mapping coordinates and completing this work for ODOT HSTC Region 6.

Gohio Commute

Team Members promoted Gohio Commute's vanpool and carpool initiatives to encourage commuters to rethink their mode of transportation to and from the workplace. The marketing campaign is using print ads with the Columbus Dispatch and digital social media advertisements on Instagram and Facebook.

MORPC is updating the two-year Transportation Demand Management (TDM) Strategic Plan. The plan will reevaluate TDM goals around mode shift initiatives and be restructured for a stronger connection to the MTP.

Regional Data Advisory Committee

The next Regional Data Advisory Committee (RDAC) meeting is June 7.

- The Capacity Building & Partnership Working Group continues to plan the September 15 Data Day event.
- The Local Government Resources Working Group is establishing a process for selecting/creating data policy resources for MORPC members.
- The Regional Municipal Fiber Strategy Working Group is collecting letters of intent.
- The Regional Information & Data Group (RIDG) met June 1.

Data & Mapping

Team members are working with communities to identify more efficient and timely ways to share building permit data for the MTP and population estimate processes.

Team Members are preparing 2022 member community population estimates which will be made available to members and the public via the MORPC Population Hub.

MORPC is compiling data to support the 2022 update of the Global Report published by the Columbus Council on World Affairs.

Team Members are updating parks, easement, and economic development areas at data inputs for the 10-county area land use model.

MORPC is working with ESRI and City of Columbus to create a sample land use scenario, using ESRI Urban

Diversity & Inclusion

MORPC hosted *Beyond Inclusion Building a Community of Belonging*, a diversity training opportunity, for MORPC Members and community partners on May 24. The training was led by YWCA Columbus.

In honor of Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month (May), MORPC hosted an employee lunch and lunch featuring guest speaker Dr. Yung-Chen Lu, professor emeritus of the mathematics department at OSU and founder of the Asian Festival. The Asian festival began in 1995 in Columbus.

MORPC participated in the Columbus Chamber of Commerce *Small Business Week*, a series of sessions which provided education, exposure, and resources not only to minority and disadvantaged business owners, but also to governmental agencies and corporations.

MORPC participated in the Somali American Chamber of Commerce Career and Resource Fair where Team Members shared information about MORPC's programs, services, and job opportunities with the immigrant and refugee community.

Team Members promoted the Air Quality program, Bike month, and Infrastructure Week through TikTok videos that increase engagement and promote inclusivity. Videos are available here.

Sustainability Advisory Committee

The next Sustainability Advisory Committee is June 8. Agenda items include the Summit on Sustainability, RAPID 5, and updates from the boards and working groups.

Sustainable2050

The next meeting Sustainable2050 meeting is June 17 at the Darby Nature Center. The meeting features RAPID 5 and efforts to protect green space. Additional MORPC members are in process of formalizing Sustainable2050 membership. One is in process of achieving tier status certification. Members are encouraged to contribute examples of local sustainability-focused policies for the Local Government Legislative Toolkit. Those who would like to be certified as a Sustainable 2050 member can reach out to MORPC Sustainability Officer Brandi Whetstone.

Central Ohio Greenways

The Central Ohio Greenways (COG) Board met May 18. Meeting topics included Celebrate Trails Day, RAPID 5, Technical Assistance Program, federal and state policy updates, and funding. Working Groups provided updates.

The Outdoor Trails Passport, a program in collaboration with Experience Columbus, is live. Residents and visitors are invited to access the passport online any time they explore a Greenways trail. By checking in at locations across the COG network, passport users become eligible to win prizes. COG Board members and partners continue to advance the Trail Town Framework planning effort. The project remains on track for completion this summer.

Water Resources Program

The next Sustaining Scioto Board meeting is June 22.

Agricultural & Rural Communities Outreach Team

The Agricultural & Rural Communities Outreach Team met May 19. Kori Gasaway with Franklin Soil and Water Conservation District presented an overview of the "Be the Change for Clean Water" program. Chair Brandt led discussions on farmer and non-farmer outreach programming in July and August.

Energy & Air Quality

MORPC celebrated Air Quality Awareness Week May 2-6 with daily social media posts and a video to increase awareness about MORPC's air quality forecasting and monitoring program, and solutions for improving air quality and equity. Team Members gave a presentation at the Air Sensors International Conference about the neighborhood level air monitoring project. Team Members are working with the North Central Area Commission and NAACP to site additional particle pollution monitors in the 43219 ZIP code, where there are concerns around industrial/vehicle pollution sources and high asthma rates. A monitor was placed at Bexley City Hall. All monitors are deployed at this time. MORPC will purchase a few more with funding from the Thriving Earth Exchange.

Energy & Air Quality Working Group

The next meeting of the Energy & Air Quality Working Group is May 24. The group will work on a draft resolution on an education, engagement, and empowerment strategy centered on SB 52 and utility-scale solar.

Energy Planning

MORPC is working on two solar co-ops that will be made available to its members:

- The Columbus Area Residential Solar Co-op, which will be open to all Franklin County residents.
- The Regional Schools Energy Strategy (ReSES), which is an opportunity for schools, school
 districts, and local governments to purchase solar power through a solar power purchase agreement
 co-op. MORPC is in discussions with interested entities. If any local government or school leader is
 interested, please contact Brian Filiatraut (<u>BFiliatraut@morpc.org</u>).

The Rickenbacker Energy Consortium met May 4 and was briefed by Team Members on MORPC's role in obtaining Bipartisan Infrastructure Law funds for the region. Buckeye Power and South Central Power presented case studies of current warehouses. The next meeting is July 13.

The next meeting of the Resident-based Environmental Sustainability Forum, a group comprised of residents who sit on local government advisory boards, committees, and commissions focused on sustainability issues, is June 22 at MORPC. One topic of discussion is the Columbus Area Residential Solar Co-op open to any homeowner in Franklin County.

WarmChoice® and HWAP Programs

COVID-19 continues to effect contractor availability, evidenced by a recent interruption for one of MORPC's larger HVAC contactors. Despite being set back by a week in completing and invoicing jobs, Team Members are catching up.

Team Members are preparing for the new software system, Neighborly.

Team Members implemented various marketing strategies to promote Residential Services' programs, including postcards sent to targeted zip codes, radio advertisement and promotion. Applications are still lower than expected. After the positive response to the postcard campaign in April, Team Members sent an additional 550 postcards the last week of May, with the hope that response will be similar or better than the initial round. Columbia Gas of Ohio is launching several marketing efforts to boost WarmChoice applicant numbers.

Additional Team Members beginning June 6 include two new field technicians and one additional Rehab Technician.

The HWAP program will conclude at the end of June. Initial and Final inspections are the current priority, and production is currently at 41 out of 59 jobs closed YTD, with 17 jobs out for HVAC or WarmChoice.

Team Members submitted a grant application to the Affordable Housing Trust. The grant amount could be up to \$116,000.

On May 26, 2022, the Licking County Commissioners approved a resolution to join the Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission (MORPC). The attached resolution accepts Licking County as a member of MORPC, which helps meet the desire of MORPC's membership to continue to grow the organization for the benefit of a stronger Central Ohio region.

The net dues will be pro-rated as of the date of membership and assessed to Licking County for 2022 in the amount of \$21,249.

RESOLUTION 09-22

"Accepting Licking County as a member of the Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission (MORPC)"

WHEREAS, Licking County recognizes the need for collaborative, cooperative planning in order to ensure continued growth and prosperity; and

WHEREAS, MORPC's mission is to be the regional voice and a catalyst for sustainability and economic prosperity in order to secure a competitive advantage for Central Ohio; and

WHEREAS, Licking County has petitioned for membership in MORPC; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of MORPC's members to continue to grow for the benefit of strong collaboration on regional issues; and

WHEREAS, Licking County will be assessed dues based on the 2021 population projections; and

WHEREAS, on May 26, 2022, the Licking County Board of Commissioners passed a resolution accepting the conditions of membership contained in MORPC's Articles of Agreement; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MID-OHIO REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION:

- Section 1. That Licking County is accepted as a member of MORPC effective June 9, 2022.
- Section 2. That the Bylaws provide that five (5) members of the Licking County Board of Commissioners are eligible to serve as voting members or that the Commissioners may appoint up to five (5) members to serve on their behalf at the MORPC Commission meetings.
- Section 3. That net 2022 dues will be pro-rated as of the date of membership (June 9, 2022) and assessed to Licking County for 2022 in the amount of \$21,249.
- Section 4. That Licking County shall be entitled to the same regular services of MORPC as are other members and that any special services will be purchased by the County based on standard MORPC rates.

This resolution adopts the 2023 membership fee schedule. Regularly increasing the dues by relatively small amounts in order to carry on the efforts of the Commission has been preferred over more infrequent but larger increases. This resolution proposes the 2023 rate in accordance with the five-year plan presented in Resolution 07-21 on June 10, 2021.

The current (2022) rate of \$0.60 includes \$0.07 restricted to building costs and/or operating reserve, \$0.20 for Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) federal matching fund requirements, and \$0.33 for MORPC services to members, development, and other local activities of the agency. Members located outside the MPO boundaries pay dues at the reduced rate of \$0.40, which excludes the MPO portion of the dues. The use of the building/operating reserve dues is identified in the annual budget formally adopted by the Commission in December.

The 2022 Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization (CORPO) rate totals \$0.50 per capita, including \$0.07 restricted to building costs and/or operating reserve, \$0.10 for CORPO matching fund requirements, and \$0.33 for MORPC services to members, development, and other local activities of the agency. This CORPO rate applies only to member counties in areas that are outside the MPO and in the 7-County CORPO area.

The 2023 rate recommendation is \$0.615 including \$0.07 restricted to building costs and/or operating reserve, \$0.205 for Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) federal matching fund requirements, and \$0.34 for MORPC services to members, development, and other local activities of the agency. Members located outside of the MPO boundaries would pay dues at the reduced rate of \$0.41, which excludes the MPO portion of the dues. The use of the building/operating reserve dues will be identified in the annual budget formally adopted by the Commission in December.

The 2023 Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization (CORPO) rate recommendation totals \$0.515 per capita, including \$0.07 restricted to building costs and/or operating reserve, \$0.105 for CORPO matching fund requirements, and \$0.34 for MORPC services to members, development, and other

local activities of the agency. This total CORPO rate applies only to member counties in areas that are outside the MPO and in the 7-County CORPO area.

Per MORPC's Bylaws:

- Each year the COMMISSION shall **adopt a fee schedule by July 31** to be used in assessing members for the upcoming calendar year.
- Every five years the COMMISSION shall establish a five-year fee schedule which it shall not exceed when adopting fees for each upcoming year (i.e. maximum dues schedule).
- Each year the Commission shall provide a non-binding estimate of fees for the next five (5) years for members to use in their financial planning.

This last bullet indicating an estimated or planned dues schedule will be presented with the annual fee schedule each year, with any updated planned rates if applicable. Note that the planned rates are not approved via resolution each year, but instead included via memo only for reference and planning purposes.

The planned five-year dues rates schedule for 2023-2027 is presented below, represented in cents per capita.

Transportation Improvement Program"

Proposed Resolution T-8-22 will add or modify three projects to the SFY 2021-2024 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) with commitments totaling over \$50 million. Additionally, one project will be removed. These changes are necessary to enable the projects to advance and to maintain fiscal constraint. In July, the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) will ask the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) to amend the Statewide TIP to include these changes.

Continued maintenance of the TIP is a key element of implementing the strategies in the 2020-2050 Metropolitan Transportation (MTP). The projects included in this amendment specifically relate to implementation of these MTP strategies:

- PRES 2: Repave or reconstruct roads in poor physical condition
- SAF 3: Implement countermeasures that address priority safety locations
- RDWY 5: Add capacity, where appropriate, at locations such as intersections to alleviate existing or anticipated congestion

Attachment 1 to the resolution provides a description of the funding and scope of the projects, including a description of the bicycle and pedestrian components. Two projects include MORPC-attributable funding.

An explanation of the proposed changes to the TIP follows.

<u>Columbus:</u> – The following modification to the TIP is being made for a Columbus project:

 PID 114254 – SR 161 at Parkville/Spring Run: Increase local funding commitment on the TIP. This project contains MORPC-attributable funding, but no changes are being made to MORPC commitments. Memo Proposed Resolution T-8-22 Page 2 of 2

<u>ODOT:</u> – The following modifications to the TIP are being made for ODOT projects:

- PID 112798 I-270 from S of I-70 to N of Alum Creek Drive, Minor Pavement Rehabilitation: Move project from SLI Group list to Individual List and increase funding on the TIP.
- PID 106959 I-71 at Sunbury Parkway, New Interchange: Remove construction phase from the TIP. Funding was delayed to SFY 2025 and this project must be removed from the TIP to maintain fiscal balance.

Whitehall – The following modification to the TIP is being made for a Whitehall project:

 PID 105768 – E Broad Street at Hamilton Road: Remove the \$50,000 other phase from the TIP. This project contains MORPC-attributable funding, but no changes are being made to MORPC commitments.

<u>RAPID 5 Update</u> – Kerstin Carr, MORPC Regional Strategy Officer & Senior Director of Planning

Kerstin Carr presented <u>RAPID 5 – Moving the Visions Along</u>. Last summer, ULI Columbus and MORPC revealed visions for the five Franklin County river corridors of how to expand and activate greenspace while honoring history and culture and protecting natural resources. While the project is focused within Franklin County, we know it goes beyond county boundaries.

Moving forward, Dr. Amy Acton is leading the RAPID 5 project. Dr. Acton always has the health and well-being of everyone at heart. She truly wants to create a region where everyone can thrive, no matter their belief system, their background, or their social status. Dr. Acton puts it like this, "Once you see those visions, you can't unsee them."

RAPID 5 is more than just creating the largest inter-connected park system in the country; it is about connecting people with nature and one another, which will benefit our residents' well-being, promote social equity, spur environmental stewardship, increase mobility, and enhance economic vitality.

Over the summer, MORPC will support Dr. Acton and the RAPID 5 Project in putting together the many puzzle pieces to create its own non-profit and the proper governance around it.

- Dr. Acton will be hiring the Benefactor group to help with the facilitation of a strategic plan, the development of the board and the appropriate structures and documents around it, as well as identifying the immediate and long-term staffing needs.
- Ginny Barney has agreed to support some of the operations as an executive advisor for the next few months. MORPC, ULI Columbus, and Metroparks are also providing some staff support in the short-term as well.
- MORPC is the temporary home for the RAPID 5 Project, which allows Dr. Acton to have an office here and utilize our infrastructure.

- MORPC worked with The Columbus Foundation to set up a separate endowment fund for the RAPID 5 Project which houses all funding and donations coming in for the project. Resolution 07-22 on the consent agenda allows MORPC to act as a fiscal intermediary to transfer dollars from the fund to the RAPID 5 Project in alignment with its budget, until the RAPID 5 Project gains its non-profit IRS status.
- Over the next months, Dr. Acton will reach out to many of you so she can meet with you and your teams and learn more about your ideas and your projects already underway.

National Guard Association of the United States & Ohio National Guard Association – Tom Calhoun, Ohio National Guard Association Executive Director

Tom Calhoun shared information on the National Guard Association of the United States & Ohio National Guard Association. This year's National Guard Association of the United States (NGAUS) conference is August 26-29 at the Greater Columbus Convention Center. They are expecting between 3,500 and 4,000 people. <u>Regional Data Advisory Committee</u> – Brad Ebersole (Delaware County), Regional Data Advisory Committee Chair

Brad Ebersole presented the <u>Regional Data Advisory Committee Update</u>. MORPC hired new Research & Data Officer Adam Porr.

MORPC and OSU's Center for Urban Regional Analysis (CURA) was accepted into the National Neighborhood Indicators Partnership (NNIP) as co-partners for the Central Ohio Region. The Partnership is a learning network, coordinated by the Urban Institute, connecting organizations across the country that share a mission to ensure all communities have access to data and the skills to use information to advance equity and well-being across neighborhoods. Being a member of the NNIP allows for significant learning opportunities from and with other national members as well as gives MORPC the opportunity to share best practices and information on a large scale.

The Local Government Resources Working Group is making substantial progress toward its goal of building a data governance resource library:

- A functional requirements document captures usability and design requirements related to the infrastructure for local resource sharing.
- A landscape scan of known existing resources is currently underway. The working group
 is laying the groundwork for what could ultimately become a database "crowdsourced"
 by MORPC members. The group is also creating an outreach and resource development
 plan, informed by RIDG and RDAC, which will help guide/structure the eventual
 crowdsourcing.

Local governments, park and joint recreation districts, conservancy districts, soil and water conservation districts, and non-profit organizations located in Franklin County are eligible to apply for these grant funds.
