DRIVE INVESTMENT

Federal Competitive Programs

The Reconnecting Communities Pilots (RCP) discretionary grant program opened in July. This program provides up to \$195 million for public engagement, planning activities, capital construction projects, and technical assistance to reconnect communities where transportation infrastructure has created barriers. Visit the RCP Program website at <https://www.transportation.gov/grants/reconnecting-communities> to access the Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) and learn about eligibility, funding, application and submission processes, and evaluation criteria. The application submission deadline is Thursday, October 13. The RCP Program welcomes applications from diverse eligible applicants regardless of size, location, and experience administering Federal funding awards.

Competitive Advantage Projects (CAP)

MORPC began meeting with counties to discuss updates to CAP projects, which will be formalized in the fall of 2022. In partnership with One Columbus, MORPC will work to support counties to update CAP project lists and to work collaboratively to identify funding to support projects.

Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS)

Team Members began visiting each of the 11 Counties in the CEDS. The purpose of the visits is to 1) introduce new economic development staff to county leaders; 2) provide an update on CEDS progress; 3) share a funding opportunity update; and 4) request a letter of support for MORPC's Economic Development District (EDD) designation.

MORPC has received several requests for support from neighboring local governments who are beginning the process of securing EDD designation. Both Toledo and the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission have reached out for guidance.

Brownfield Assessments

MORPC's grant from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) continues to move forward with projects moving into new phases. The Sampling Analysis Plan (SAP) for Gladden house was issued June 9. Phase II field work began at Gladden House June 21.

MORPC began to strategize on an approach for the U.S. EPA Brownfield funding release for the Fall of 2022.

Defense

In July, Senator Brown inserted an \$8 million earmark for the Rickenbacker firing range into the MILCON/VA Appropriations bill. While the bill faces an uncertain fate this year, this was a huge next step in our effort to get this project funded.

Metropolitan Transportation Plan

Team Members continue to consult recent planning documents that might impact the review and update of goals and objectives for the 2024-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) plan. Staff facilitated an interagency consultation for a new air quality conformity determination related to a proposed amendment to the 2020-2050 MTP to add projects in New Albany related to the Intel development. Team Members continue to compile data for the 2022 MTP Report Card.

US 23 Connect Study

MORPC continues to work with ODOT, the Toledo Metropolitan Area Council of Governments, and the consultant team on Phase B of the study. Phase B continues the engagement and analysis of the Route 23 Connect Study and narrows its focus to identify opportunities for smaller improvements along U.S. 23 that are impactful sooner. The study team is developing a new Public Engagement Plan and Study Fact Sheet.

Transportation Review Advisory Council

Team Members are evaluating TRAC applications submitted within the MPO region to develop a regional priority list of projects. Concurrently, MORPC is seeking public comment on projects through Friday, August 12. More information on each application may be found at morpc.org/funding. RAPID 5

In late June, RAPID 5 announced the addition of Jennifer Peterson as Chief Operating Officer. Peterson was previously the Chief Executive at Easton. Over the next few months, RAPID 5 will continue to evolve as its own non-profit and will host listening sessions in the community. LinkUs Mobility Initiative

Partners released the LinkUS Community Action Plan in June. The plan lays out five steps for the region to advance mobility and development for the future.

On June 10, MORPC hosted the first Transit Supportive Infrastructure (TSI) workshop for COTA service area municipalities to begin forming this new group. MORPC hosted the second TSI workshop July 22.

Team Members continue to participate in the Downtown Convergence Planning Study and will assist with traffic modeling exercises.

Team Members met with Homer Carlise, staff to the U.S. Senate Banking Housing and Urban Development Committee, to discuss local funding mechanisms to compete for a federal Capital Investments Grant Program for corridors consistent with the LinkUS initiative.

FTA Section 5310 Designated Recipient

MORPC accepted deliveries of two vans for the Columbus Chamber of Human Services (Open Door Columbus). Three fiscal year 2021 5310 grant awards were executed with the Federal Transit Administration for approximately \$1.5 million in enhanced mobility funding. Team Members continue to monitor the production timelines for transit vehicles and pricing for future vehicle purchases. Fiscal year 2021 awards were initiated by the end of July 2022.

CORPO

Team Members assisted with the following:

- Fairfield County – proposed update to the County's Active Transportation Plan
- Union County – possible development of the Cardinal Trail Route
- Regional Trail Town Steering Committee Central Ohio Greenways
- Knox County – development of an economic strategy scope of work which will better prepare the county for the arrival of Intel to the region. The approach and processes that Knox County is using was shared by Knox County officials with regional partners at an Intel-related meeting held at MORPC in late July.
- Recipients of the CORPO Dedicated Funds program – coordinate meetings with ODOT

ODOT, CORPO and other Regional Transportation Planning Organizations (RTPOs) met to discuss Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) related responsibilities that will occur this year. ODOT recently issued guidance on rural consultation which will be utilized in the coming months.

Team Members received two applications from CORPO members for the ODOT Transportation Review Advisory Council (TRAC) funding program and will evaluate the projects. A memo was sent to CORPO stakeholders detailing the proposed TRAC projects and CORPO's role in submitting priorities.

MORPC Attributable Funding

MORPC received commitment updates on July 8 and screened applications for new funding requests on July 15. Team Members are working to provide feedback on screening applications in advance of the final application due date on September 28.

Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC)

OPWC was allocated more than \$30 million for state fiscal year 2024 in loans and grants for local infrastructure projects in ODOT District 3/Franklin County through the State Capital Improvement Program (SCIP) and the Local Transportation Improvement Program (LTIP). Application materials are posted on MORPC's website. Eligible projects include improvements to roads, bridges, culverts, water supply systems, wastewater systems, storm water collection systems, and solid waste disposal facilities. The Public Works Integrating Committee for District 3 will recommend funding awards for projects that are scheduled to begin construction between July 1, 2023, and June 30, 2024. Completed applications for all applicants in District 3 are due by 5 p.m., Friday, September 2.

Clean Ohio Conservation Fund

Round 17 of the Clean Ohio Conservation Fund kicks off with an applicant workshop on October 3 at 1:30 p.m. The goal of the workshop is to introduce new applicants to the application process for the next funding cycle. CREATE AN ENVIRONMENT FOR PROSPERITY

Diversity & Inclusion

On June 25, MORPC partnered with Columbus City Council, COTA, CRIS, and the Columbus Council on World Affairs to host the Inaugural Columbus International Summit. The goal of the summit was to provide resources to our immigrant, migrant, and refugee communities while putting an emphasis on the diverse cultures that make our region a vibrant place to live, work and raise a family. The event was promoted on social media and our website. Highlights of the day included:

- A naturalization ceremony, facilitated by Chief Judge Algernon L. Marbley, where more than 50 individuals were granted United States citizenship.
- Community partners hosted panel discussions addressing transportation, housing, and education.
- More than 40 organizations, vendors and social service agencies – including MORPC – were present to share community resources with constituents.

MORPC is participating in Clean Fuels Ohio's Equity-Focused Community Collaboration committee. Through this new initiative, Clean Fuels Ohio is partnering with underinvested, low income, and Black, Indigenous and People of Color (BIPOC) communities to apply expertise toward finding sustainable transportation solutions.

MORPC is participating in the August 13 National African American Male Wellness Walk, an annual 5K that benefits the African American Male Wellness Agency. The agency works to reduce disparities in premature death and chronic diseases by offering free health screenings and innovative educational programs. Team Members are being part of MORPC's passion team as walkers, as well as interacting with community members at our resource table.

MORPC was recognized by COMTO Columbus with a 2022 scholarship award in our name. Team Members attended the *“Mobilizing Equity in the Transportation Industry”* scholarship luncheon to support diverse students interested in the transportation field who were receiving scholarships.

Transportation Safety

MORPC and Franklin County Public Health completed three Complete Streets Safety Audits with the Cities of Reynoldsburg, Whitehall, and Grove City. Each jurisdiction received a Summary Report detailing the audit findings and an implementation plan laying out recommended treatments and available resources/opportunities for enacting safety improvements in the study areas.

Team Members began providing safety analysis assistance to Franklin Township analyzing the crash history and existing conditions along the Township’s stretch of W. Broad St. This positions them to apply for a formal safety study of the corridor. Next steps include drafting a formal report for existing conditions and initiating coordination with ODOT.

Team Members continue assisting members with the federal discretionary grant program Safe Streets 4 All.

Regional Housing Strategy (RHS)

Team members shared the RHS with various audiences throughout the region, including Fairfield County, Knox County, and Genoa Township.

MORPC is accepting requests for presentations and workshops for those interested in a housing workshop for their community’s elected officials, staff, or community leaders. Team Members will assist with designing the agenda and recommend speakers and learning objectives. Contact Jennifer Noll for more information at JNoll@morpc.org.

Technical Assistance Program

Work is well underway with the four communities that received technical assistance awards.

- City of Columbus – Team Members joined the City on an Engineer’s Bike Ride which surveyed the on-the-ground conditions of various downtown streets from a bicyclist’s perspective. Findings from this activity will be utilized to further inform analyses of the identified route alternatives and the specific infrastructural and funding opportunities they may afford.
- City of Dublin – On June 2, MORPC and the City hosted a trail access & connectivity workshop with key local and northwest area stakeholders. The workshop identified specific multi-jurisdictional opportunities that are well-suited for further study and coordination with other planning efforts, such as LinkUS Transit Supportive Infrastructure (TSI). These opportunities were further explored during a site visit of the identified routes.
- Metro Parks – Metro Parks is coordinating with key stakeholders to assess the feasibility of potential trail extension alignments that abut or intersect their properties from Scioto Audubon Park south to I-270. Team Members are engaged in an alternatives analysis that will scrutinize and critically compare the various alignments identified so far.
- City of Sunbury – Team Members attended the City’s June 27 Planning & Zoning Commission meeting to host a trail access & connectivity workshop with key local and regional stakeholders. Staff and stakeholders explored opportunities and barriers to filling in the gaps in the Ohio to Erie Trail and better connecting the trail to key locations in and around the city. Staff also engaged in a site visit and hosted a public workshop.

Mobility Management

Team Members engaged in local and regional meetings to coordinate follow through with strategies identified in the Human Service Transportation Coordinated Plan (HSTC) for ODOT Region 6. A benchmarking activity was designed and delivered by MORPC to county stakeholders. This activity will occur quarterly and will support the annual update of the plan and reporting to ODOT.

Team Members continue to work with Ohio mobility managers and the Ohio Department of Transportation on Gohio Mobility, the statewide specialized transportation search tool.

Gohio Commute

Team Members formed a new vanpool traveling to the Zanesville VA Clinic. This is our first vanpool to the Zanesville VA Clinic.

MORPC participated in the Columbus Chamber's Experience Series panel about employee benefits to educate companies about the importance of providing transportation benefits as part of their employee benefit package.

Team Members worked with the Army National Guard to set up their vanpool program in Central Ohio.

Team Members updated the Central Ohio Transportation Demand Management (TDM) Strategic Plan for 2022-2024.

The Gohio Commute program continues to run a marketing campaign focused specifically on vanpooling and carpooling. This program is being promoted on two highway billboards, as well as music streaming service, Spotify. Other outreach activities include:

Team Members will represent Central Ohio at the National Neighborhood Indicators Partnership annual meeting in October.

Sustainability

MORPC hosted the June 22 resident-based Environmental Sustainability Forum, a group comprised of residents who serve on local government advisory boards, committees, and commissions that are focused on sustainability issues. The group heard from Solar United Neighbors about the Columbus Area Residential Solar Co-op which launched July 12.

The Outdoor Trails Passport, a program in collaboration with Experience Columbus, is live. Residents and visitors are invited to access the passport online any time they explore a Greenways trail. By checking in at locations across the COG network, passport users become eligible to win prizes.

COG Board members and partners continue to advance the Trail Town Framework planning effort. The project remains on track for completion in the Summer of 2022. Team Members are working to secure funding for an Urban Trail Town Framework that will expand on the work of the Trail Town efforts in progress.

Team Members secured funding from ODOT for a wayfinding study that will launch in late 2022.

The Agricultural & Rural Communities Outreach Team met July 21. Members are finalizing two upcoming events:

- The Scioto Watershed Whole Farm Conservation Event – August 16, Waldo, Ohio. Discussion topics include “*Return on Investment of Conservation Practices*” and “*Incentive & Cost Share Opportunities*.” The event is open to agronomists, conservation professionals, and farmers. Air Quality

After nearly two years of no alerts, MORPC issued four Air Quality Alerts during the month of June. Air Quality Index (AQI) levels observed in June 2022 were Good on 14 days, Moderate on 13 days, and Unhealthy for Sensitive Groups (USG) on 3 days. The AQI reached 143 on June 21 due to ozone, which is the highest AQI for ozone in Central Ohio since July 2, 2012. The conditions leading to high ozone AQI levels included a strong ridge of high pressure aloft that limited atmospheric mixing, elevated ozone precursors due to smoke, high temperatures in the mid-90s that enhanced ozone development, and light winds that limited dispersion. AQI levels also reached USG on June 25 and 29 as wildfire smoke from the West and hot temperatures lingered over the Ohio Valley for the last week of the month.

Energy & Air Quality Working Group

On June 8, Energy & Air Quality Working Group leadership presented the group's Senate Bill 52 Education, Engagement & Empowerment Strategy to the Sustainability Advisory Committee (SAC). SAC approved the Senate Bill 52 strategy. The next step is to work with the Public Policy Roundtable as they develop their 2023-2024 public policy agenda.

The Working Group met July 26. Meeting topics included updates from MORPC on policy, Senate Bill 52 strategy, and air quality alerts; statewide picture on air quality alerts; and a presentation from David Celebrezze of Columbus GreenSpot detailing data collection and research for the Columbus-Franklin County Urban Heat Island Project.

Energy Planning

MORPC is working on two solar co-ops that will be made available to its members:

- The Columbus Area Residential Solar Co-op launched July 12 at the Linden Community Center. City of Columbus Council member Emmanuel Remy, City of Bexley Mayor Ben Kessler, Solar United Neighbor Program Associate Mryia Williams, and the IMPACT Empowered! Program participant Ras

Jahlani Benlevi spoke about the importance of empowering residents and communities with this solar co-op. The co-op will help residents be a part of the solution toward mitigating the effects of a changing climate. The solar co-op is open to all residents who live in Franklin County. If interested in learning more and possibly joining the co-op, please visit solarunitedneighbors.org/columbus.

- The Regional Schools Energy Strategy (ReSES) is an opportunity for schools, school districts, and local governments to purchase solar power through a solar power purchase agreement co-op. MORPC is in discussions with interested entities. If any local government or school leader is interested, please contact Brian Filiatraut at BFiliatraut@morpc.org.

The Rickenbacker Energy Consortium met July 13 and heard from the Ohio Air Quality Development Authority (OAQDA) and the Columbus-Franklin County Finance Authority (CFCFA). Each provided an overview of their organization and how they could help start fruitful public and private partnerships in the Rickenbacker area.

On July 19, MORPC hosted the Central Ohio stakeholder meeting to present the draft statewide electric vehicle strategy to unlock National Electric Vehicle Infrastructure (NEVI) Formula Program funds. Ohio will receive over \$100 million across the next five years for direct current fast chargers (DCFC) to be installed along designated Alternative Fuel Corridors. DriveOhio and ODOT are working with a broad set of stakeholders across the state and submitted Ohio's plan August 1. The draft Ohio NEVI Program plan is available for review and public comment on the DriveOhio website at [Ohio Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Deployment Plan](#).

WarmChoice® and HWAP Programs

The new software system, Neighborly, goes live in early August

New WarmChoice applicant interest is low. The postcard campaign, started earlier in the spring, is continuing with batches of 800 to 1,000 postcards sent to potentially qualified residences in June and July. The campaign has had some success since its start.

A new Field Technician position was filled in June to help offset the current, low client application rate. The Field Technician began working on jobs that had been stalled and is responsible for completing over twenty jobs in July.

MORPC met its HWAP Program Year 2021-2022 goal of 59 jobs (18 of which were completed in June). MORPC is one of only a few providers that successfully completed their annual goal. Initial inspections have been steady. We are expecting to be above production expectations for HWAP. During slow times, MORPC inspectors will train in performing HWAP final inspections.

The Home Repair Program recently received a grant of \$60,000 from the Affordable Housing Trust. Fourteen homes were started under the Lead Safe Program. Training dates were set for the new Healthy Homes Grant. The date is set for the second meeting concerning contractor recruitment. The new Rehab Tech position was filled.

SUBJECT: **"AMENDING THE 2020-2050 METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION PLAN"**

To support the development of the proposed Intel site and the resulting regional growth, state and local agencies have committed to advancing area roadway network improvements. This amendment is proposed to incorporate the corridor information resulting from the planned state and local Intel-related investments.

For one freeway project already identified in the 2020-2050 MTP, the limit will be extended to the west and the cost estimate will be updated to reflect recent design work. Nine projects that were not previously included in the MTP are proposed to be added as part of this amendment. These projects are all listed and mapped in the attachment along with more information on fiscal balance and air quality conformity.

A formal public comment period on the proposed amendment began on July 15, 2022 and will be open through August 15, 2022.

Committees will be asked to act on a resolution amending the 2020-2050 MTP in September. The amendment and the revised MTP, including the revised project listing, maps, fiscal balance information, air quality conformity documentation and other amendment-related changes, will be placed on the website once the resolution to amend the MTP has been approved.

2020-2050 COLUMBUS AREA METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION PLAN

Proposed Amendment to Modify One Project and Add Nine Projects

This amendment is to modify the limits and adjust the cost estimate and construction timeframe of one Freeway project and add nine projects to the 2020-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP).

Background

In early 2022, Intel, a multinational technology company, announced that it has selected a site in the Licking County portion of the New Albany International Business Park as the location for a \$20 billion+ chip manufacturing project. The company plans to build two state-of-the-art factories by 2025.

The megaproject, which will be the largest single private sector company investment in Ohio's history, is expected to generate thousands of jobs in the state, including direct Intel jobs, jobs supporting chip manufacturing, and construction jobs in New Albany.

To support the development of the site and the resulting regional growth, state and local agencies have committed to advancing area roadway network improvements.

MTP Project Changes

For one freeway project already identified in the 2020-2050 MTP, the limit will be extended to the west and the cost estimate will be updated to reflect recent design work. The construction timeframe will also advance to reflect ODOT's project delivery timeline.

This project is:

- MTP ID 464: SR-161 from I-270 (*previously Harlem Rd.*) to US-62, Add one lane each direction

The following projects that were not previously included in the MTP are proposed to be added as part of this amendment:

- MTP ID 1840: I-270 from SR-161 to SR-3; Add one lane in northbound direction
- MTP ID 1841: Green Chapel Rd. from US 62 to Clover Valley Rd; Add turn lanes and complete street facilities to 2 lane roadway
- MTP ID 1842: Green Chapel Rd. from Clover Valley Rd. to Mink St; Widen road from 2 lanes to 4 lanes total both directions with complete street facilities
- MTP ID 1843: Mink St. from SR-161 eastbound ramps to Green Chapel Rd; Widen road from 2 lanes to 4 lanes total both directions with complete street facilities
- MTP ID 1844: Harrison Rd. Extension from Clover Valley Rd. to Mink St.; New Roadway 1 lane(s) each direction with complete street facilities
- MTP ID 1845: Clover Valley Rd. from Jug St. to Green Chapel Rd. Add turn lanes and complete street facilities to 2 lane roadway
- MTP ID 1846: Beech Rd. from Innovation Corridor Way to Jug St.; Widen road from 2 to 4 lanes total both directions with complete street facilities

- MTP ID 1847: Beech Rd. from Jug St. to US-62; Add turn lanes and complete street facilities to 2 lane roadway
- MTP ID 1848: Miller Rd. from Beech Rd. to Clover Valley Rd; Add turn lanes and complete street facilities to 2 lane roadway

Fiscal Balance

The 2020-2050 MTP identifies \$31.8 billion in expected resources for transportation projects through 2050 and has identified \$30.3 billion in project costs. The refined and added project cost estimates associated with the projects proposed in this amendment fall within that \$1.5 billion surplus.

Air Quality Conformity

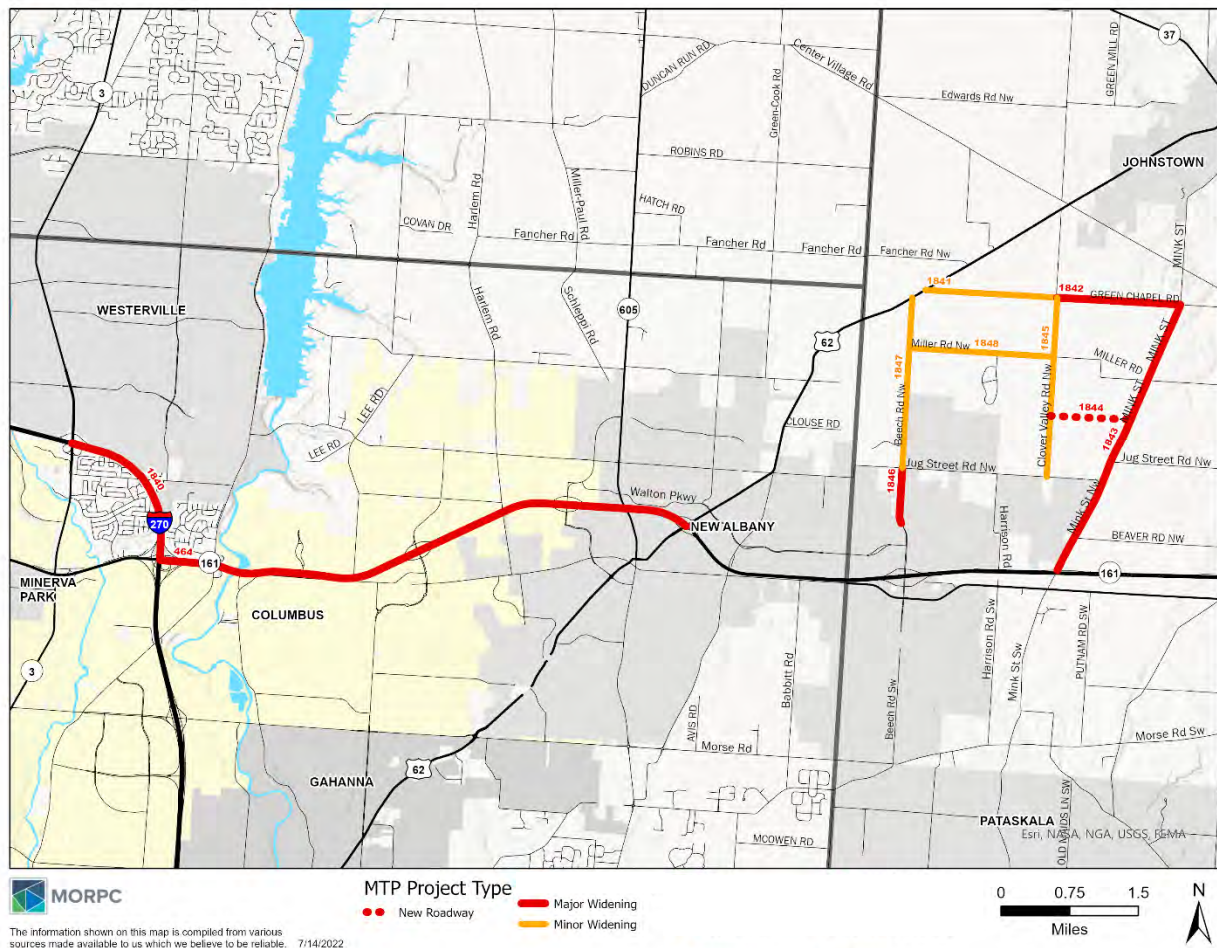
Due to the significance of the proposed changes to the MTP, it is federally required to do an analysis to confirm the projects included in the amended MTP do not lead to violations in the air quality standard or delay obtaining the standard. This is called a conformity determination. The incorporation of the projects in the proposed amendments into the conformity analysis has been completed. In addition to the project changes, the latest planning assumptions regarding 2050 population and employment for the region were adjusted to reflect the committed known direct impacts of the Intel development. Approximately 8,600 people and 8,500 employees were added to the 2050 forecast and allocated to locations expected to experience immediate direct impacts from the development. Appendix B of the 2020-2050 MTP has been updated accordingly and shows the amended MTP is in conformity.

Public Involvement

This amendment packet and the revised conformity determination appendix is being made available for a 30-day comment period through August 15, 2022. Regional Data Advisory Committee – Brad Ebersole (Delaware County), Regional Data Advisory Committee Chair

The Capacity Building & Partnership Working Group is planning a Data Day on September 15 to convene participants interested in learning about data usage, management, storytelling, and more. Stay tuned for a detailed agenda and registration information.

As part of the 20-year transportation plan, MORPC uses a land use model to forecast future population and jobs. An important input to this process is identification of expected future land use in your community. The data is based on local plans and known planned development. However, MORPC relies on expert local knowledge to confirm this information. The dataset is updated every four years. This year the area expanded from seven to ten counties. MORPC requests that a representative from each jurisdiction review the data available on our future land use map (www.morpc.org/landuse) by June 30. If you see anything that appears incorrect or if you have any new development plans we missed, please reach out to Cheri Mansperger.

Preliminary research by the Regional Municipal Fiber Working Group, co-chaired by Sam Orth, City of Columbus and Gene Oliver, City of Worthington, indicates the region is well-positioned to create a municipal fiber network and that emerging funding opportunities may reduce barriers to entry for communities to participate. SUBJECT: Proposed Resolution 10-22: **“Authorizing the executive director to enter into, administer, and/or sub-allocate contracts for approximately \$1.56 million from the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5310 funding and additional local funding”**

This resolution authorizes the executive director to enter into and administer contracts with subrecipients receiving Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5310 funds and additional local funding.

MORPC is the Designated Recipient and administrator for the Federal Transit Administration’s (FTA) Section 5310 to enhance the mobility of older adults and persons with disabilities pursuant to 49 U.S.C. for the Columbus, Ohio urbanized area. Staff is obligated to receive and expend one federal fiscal year of funds for projects approved by MORPC’s Transportation Policy Resolution T-14-21.

The Central Ohio Transit Authority (COTA) and Delaware County Transit Board (DCT) are Direct Recipients with FTA. They administer Section 5310 funds that have been awarded by MORPC creating a sub-allocation agreement to pass-through Section 5310 funds to an eligible transit entity. Their awards are approximately \$403,000.

- Approximately \$100,000 was directed to COTA and DCT for purchased transportation.
- Approximately \$303,000 was directed to DCT capitalized maintenance and Mobility Management programs.

MORPC’s procedures with FTA are documented in MORPC’s Program Management Plan to administer funds between FTA and approved subrecipients. All federal requirements will be met with federal oversight. Based on signed contracts, MORPC will reimburse subrecipients or make purchases with budgeted MORPC funds for approved capital items purchased according to proper procurement policies.

Below is an overview of the remaining \$1.152 million.

- Over \$905,000 was awarded to private non-profits, local governments, and other public transportation providers to purchase capital items such as lift equipped vehicles, purchased

transportation and preventative maintenance. Additional local funds will be used to make up the difference between the award amount and the price of purchased vehicles.

- MORPC Administration will receive \$116,044.
- MORPC Mobility Management will receive \$130,000.

MORPC, COTA, DCT, and FTA will have \$1.56 million in executed agreements awarding Section 5310 funds to direct and subrecipients. These awards include lift equipped vehicles, acquisition of transportation services, and preventive maintenance on existing Section 5310 vehicles.

WHEREAS, the Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission (MORPC) is the Designated Recipient and administrator for the Federal Transit Administration's (FTA) Section 5310 program for enhancing the mobility of older adults and persons with disabilities pursuant to 49 U.S.C. in the Columbus, Ohio urbanized area; and

WHEREAS, these projects and programs were approved by MORPC's Transportation Policy Resolution T-14-21; and

WHEREAS, the Central Ohio Transit Authority (COT) and Delaware County Transit Board (DCT) are Direct Recipients with FTA and will administer approximately \$403,000 in Section 5310 funds that were awarded by MORPC creating a sub-allocation agreement to pass-through Section 5310 funds to an eligible transit entity; and

WHEREAS, the Section 5310 funds for subrecipients have been recommended and approved by MORPC and the FTA according to MORPC's approved FTA Program Management Plan to receive over \$905,000 for the purchase of vehicles and other capital items under FTA Grant numbers; and

WHEREAS, additional local funds will be used to make up the difference between the award amount and the price of purchased vehicles; and

WHEREAS, MORPC is an authorized Designated Recipient and will administer funds between FTA and approved subrecipients according to MORPC's Program Management Plan; and

WHEREAS, purchases performed pursuant to these contracts for vehicle and other capital items using Section 5310 and additional local funds will be under the oversight of MORPC and be implemented through a combination of MORPC staff, approved subrecipients, and FTA; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MID-OHIO REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION:

- Section 1. That the executive director is authorized to enter into, administer, and/or sub-allocate contracts for approximately \$1.56 million from the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5310 funding and additional local funding.
- Section 2. That as part of the \$1.56 million, the executive director is authorized to enter into and administer contracts with subrecipients receiving over \$905,000 in FTA Section 5310 funding and additional local funding.
- Section 3. That the executive director is authorized to approve change orders for amounts up to the financial authorization levels in the MORPC bylaws without further authorization from this Commission.
- Section 4. That the executive director is authorized to take such other action and execute and deliver such other documents as, acting with the advice of legal counsel, he shall deem necessary and appropriate to carry out the intent of this resolution.

Section 5. That this Commission finds and determines that all formal deliberations and actions of this Commission concerning and relating to the adoption of this resolution were taken in open meetings of this Commission.
