DRIVE INVESTMENT

Interregional Connections

The Central Ohio region submitted a letter of intent for the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) Corridor Identification Program based on the Cincinnati-Dayton-Columbus-Cleveland (3C+D) and Chicago-Ft. Wayne-Columbus-Pittsburgh passenger rail lines.

Metropolitan Transportation Plan

A resolution to amend the 2020-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) was adopted by the Transportation Policy Committee, Transportation Advisory Committee, and the Community Advisory Committee with an amendment to the resolution requesting that ODOT include high-capacity transit in the design, right-of-way, and construction of the amended MTP project 464.

Team Members crafted goals, objectives, and performance measures for the 2024-2050 MTP.

Federal Competitive Programs

MORPC partnered with four member jurisdictions to submit applications to the Safe Streets and Roads for All program. All four applications were for construction of safety projects.

<u>Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS)</u> Meetings with all the CEDS counties are complete.

With letters of support secured from nearly all the CEDS counties, Team Members are focused on research and data development for the EDD designation request. The first draft of the designation request will be submitted to the EDA in the fall of 2022.

A letter of concurrence for the EDD designation has been requested from the State of Ohio. Team Members are working to secure the signed letter from Governor DeWine.

MORPC Attributable Funding

In mid-August, applicants received feedback from MORPC regarding screening applications. Final applications for funding were due September 28. A full summary of final applications was presented to the Attributable Funds Committee on October 5.

Transportation Review Advisory Council (TRAC)

The priority list of applications from the MORPC MPO region was approved by the Transportation Policy Committee at its September 8 meeting. The list and public comments received was transmitted to TRAC by October 5. A regional public hearing for these projects will be held October 12 at the ODOT Central Office.

Competitive Advantage Projects (CAP)

During its meetings with each of the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy counties, MORPC Team Members reviewed current CAP projects and began discussions about updates in individual counties.

During the CORPO quarterly meeting, Team Members reviewed CAP updates for Fairfield, Knox, Madison, Marion, Morrow, Pickaway, Union Counties.

Brownfield Assessments

MORPC is awaiting the release of the next round of Brownfield funding from the U.S. EPA. Strategies for the application approach include a focus on equity-based projects, food deserts, and areas of general economic distress.

<u>Grants</u>

MORPC hired a Grants Intern and a Grants Coordinator to support increasing requests from regional stakeholders for support around research, analysis, and application of grant and project funding.

Team Members provided support for:

- Perry County and Townships and Cities in the County around HB 377 and the upcoming release of \$500 million in Appalachian grant funding from the State of Ohio.
- Stakeholders research around EDA Public Works funding opportunities.

Legislative Advocacy

The Public Policy Agenda Working Group met September 15 to begin work on the 2023-2024 Public Policy Agenda.

US 23 Connect Study

Team Members continue supporting ODOT by participating on stakeholder meetings.

LinkUs Mobility Initiative

MORPC is attending the COTA Short-Range Transportation Plan (SRTP) Meetings to assist COTA in jurisdictional meetings regarding the next five-year planning strategy for COTA operations. Team Members are engaged in ongoing committee and working group meetings for the LinkUS initiative.

<u>CORPO</u>

MORPC hosted seven CORPO County Subcommittee Meetings that included representatives from ODOT Districts 5 and 6 and acted as STIP-related rural consultation meetings. Draft performance measures, TRAC recommendations and STIP project lists/maps were shared. CORPO Members were asked to submit comments by mid-October.

Team Members provided guidance and support for the following:

- US Moves Coalition in Union County
- MORPC/CORPO joint application for the Safe Streets for All grant. The grant will provide funding for a safety action plan for the CORPO region.
- Parks and Trails Working Group in Union County

Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Coordination with ODOT is underway for the SFY 2024-2027 TIP. This process will be ongoing until the updated TIP is adopted in the spring of 2023.

Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC)

Applicants in Franklin County District 3 submitted 19 applications requesting a total of \$48 million in SCIP/LTIP funding for the fiscal year 2023 beginning July 1, 2023. Approximately \$31 million is available. The Team is reviewing and scoring applications. The Public Works Integrating Committee's (PWIC) next meeting is October 21.

Clean Ohio Conservation Fund

Round 17 of the Clean Ohio Conservation Fund kicked off with an applicant workshop on October 3. The goal of the workshop was to introduce new applicants to the application process for the next funding cycle. Preliminary screeners are due December 9. Transportation Safety

Team Members provided assistance and letters of support to several member communities in their application for the new federal discretionary grant program <u>Safe Streets and Roads for All</u>. This included City of Columbus, City of Dublin, City of Hilliard, and City of Upper Arlington.

Assistance is available for crash data analysis and safety funding applications, including but not limited to ODOT's <u>Highway Safety Improvement Program</u>. Technical Assistance Program

Technical Assistance services for a Central Ohio Greenways Vision Refinement Activity for Metro Parks are complete. An implementation plan, alternatives analysis tool, and geodatabase were provided to the client. Metro Parks applied for MORPC attributable funding and are now working with a design consultant to further progress toward implementing the recommended alignment for extending the Scioto Trail.

The Trail Access & Connectivity study for the City of Sunbury is complete. The client received a portfolio of documentation that includes recommendations for better connecting Sunbury communities to the Ohio-to-Erie Trail.

The Implementation Plans for the Cities of Columbus and Dublin are being developed and reviewed. When complete, these plans will recommend bike and trail access alignments to be prioritized for further feasibility study, funding applications, and implementation.

Cycle 3 of the Technical Assistance Program is being developed. The Program Guide is being reviewed and updated for a new round of assistance to begin in 2023. The application window will likely open in November 2022.

Mobility Management

The Union County Moves Coalition met and discussed forming a new workforce transportation subcommittee and startup of the county's first homeless shelter. ODOT's Office of Transit release transit funding awards. Madison and Fayette Counties continue to work toward coordinating mobility solutions.

FTA Section 5310 Designated Recipient

Team Members continue to work on the 2021 round of 5310 projects. They discussed 2019/2020 outstanding vehicle deliveries with vendors.

Gohio Commute

Car-Free Day was September 22. Commuters were encouraged to try other forms of transportation.

The Gohio Commute program continues to run a marketing campaign focused specifically on vanpooling and carpooling. This program is being promoted by billboard placement and social media.

New marketing brochures were created in French to reach more diverse audiences.

Regional Data Advisory Committee

The Regional Data Advisory Committee (RDAC) met September 13. Jay Knox, Director of Client Research from One Columbus, is a new committee member and Christina Drummond accepted the position of Vice-Chair. Meeting materials are available <u>here</u>.

- The Capacity Building & Partnership Working Group: Hena Masood accepted the role of Working Group Chair. Data Day is rescheduled for early March 2023 in partnership with Ohio University.
- The Local Government Resources Working Group created an online resource hub for data policy resources. Members are encouraged to share resources or recommendations for resources with the Working Group via the online submission form.
- The Regional Municipal Fiber Strategy Working Group meets October 27.
- The Regional Data Agenda Working Group's Kickoff meeting is October 19.
- The Regional Information & Data Group's (RIDG) next meeting is December 7 and will feature Columbus City Auditor Megan Kilgore and other local government auditors in a round table discussion of the impacts to local budgets. As the Steering Committee Chair's term will end in December, a new Chair and Vice-Chair will be elected at the December meeting.
- The Regional Information & Data Group (RIDG) Steering Committee plans to shorten the length of full RIDG meetings to 90 minutes and to be primarily virtual. The Steering Committee hopes to proactively engage with RDAC Members to help implement RDAC initiatives and goals. The committee also hopes to welcome additional members in 2023.

Data & Mapping

Team Members continue to explore ways to standardize data tools and workflows and to improve version control and documentation. They identified opportunities to break the member population estimation process into modular components and are experimenting with techniques to formalize the schemas of the input and output data using schema descriptions in Apache Avro format.

Team Members began the process of taking over management of the PurpleAir air quality data and data retrieval and analysis scripts created as part of the Thriving Earth Exchange grant effort. This effort is expected to include management of a GitHub repository, a cloud-based file storage repository, periodic execution of data retrieval scripts, and analysis of the data upon request.

MORPC released the 2022 member community population estimates for internal review. The estimates will be available to members and the public via the MORPC Population Hub. The estimates will inform the determination of 2023 membership dues.

Team Members worked with community partners to model the potential impacts of the Intel development on the region's economy, demographics, and built environment.

Sustainability Advisory Committee

The Sustainability Advisory Committee met September 29. Meeting materials are available here.

Sustainable2050

Sustainable2050 met September 16. The agenda included updates on air quality, energy, clean energy opportunities under the Inflation Reduction Act, and a sustainability toolkit which is under development. Joe Flarida with Power a Clean Future Ohio, and Nolan Rutschilling with the Ohio Environmental Council, presented an overview of their recent report titled The Bill is Coming Due: Calculating the Financial Cost of

Climate Change to Ohio's Local Governments. Several members expressed interest in focusing the next quarterly meeting on the federal funding opportunities from the Inflation Reduction Act and bi-partisan infrastructure bill and identifying where they have common interests. The next meeting is December 9. Membership and tier status certification is open to MORPC members. Central Ohio Greenways (COG)

Based on committee recommendations, Tobi Otulana with Yay Bikes! and Jody Dzuranin, Executive Director of the Ohio to Erie Trail were offered seats on the Board and began their terms as board members on September 21.

The Outdoor Trails Passport, a program in collaboration with Experience Columbus, is live. Residents and visitors are invited to access the passport online any time they explore a greenways trail. By checking in at locations across the COG network, passport users become eligible to win prizes.

COG secured funding from ODOT for a Wayfinding Study that will launch in late 2022.

Central Ohio Blueways

Initial base mapping is in process to determine jurisdictions who would be impacted by a Blueways Program and Water Trail Designation of the five major waterways, which include Big Darby Creek, Scioto River, Olentangy River, Alum Creek, and Big Walnut Creek, as well as the mileage of waterways and the number of access points within each. In conjunction with a timeline for the completion of each, the program charter is being revised with updated goals and objectives.

Sustaining Scioto Board

The next Sustaining Scioto Board meeting is October 26.

Agricultural & Rural Communities Outreach Team

The Agricultural & Rural Communities Outreach Team met September 15 to discuss strategies for increasing visibility for the working team and the general Sustaining Scioto Board. Members were also tasked with developing priorities for 2023, including increasing membership in the Working Team and making recommendations for members representing the agricultural community in the Sustaining Scioto Board. The team attended the <u>Future of the Scioto Watershed webinar</u> and discussed strategies to help increase value and interest in subsequent events. The next meeting is November 17.

Air Quality

No air quality alerts were issued during September.

Team Members provided input on a proposed no-idling policy for the City of Upper Arlington and offered policy templates and resources for local governments, organizations, and businesses interested in adopting vehicle no-idling policies to reduce emissions and improve air quality. Those who adopt a policy are eligible to receive free no-idling parking lot signs on a first come, first served basis.

The attached Resolution 14-22 provides population estimates for January 1, 2022 for the purpose of assessing participation fees from member jurisdictions. The member participation fees ("dues") are calculated using the rates adopted in Resolution 08-22.

The population estimates for 2023 member dues calculations reflect change in the population from April 1, 2020 to January 1, 2022. In the data, we continue to see the lingering effects of the COVID-19 pandemic in terms of higher-than-typical death rates, lower-than-typical birth rates, and a relatively low level of migration to the region. At the close of 2021, birth and migration rates were beginning to trend back toward recent historical norms. Although the death rate was still trending upward at that time, the rate of increase was slowing; an encouraging sign that suggests we may see a trend back toward historical norms when the data is available for 2022.

Despite the continuing challenges imposed by the pandemic, our member communities collectively increased in population by around 5,000 residents. For most individual communities, this relatively low overall growth tended to result in estimates that were comparable to last year, with the biggest increases accruing to places that are actively developing housing units and group residences such as dormitories and senior-care facilities. While the overall growth is slower than we experienced throughout much of the 2010s, periods of faster or slower growth are part of the normal cycle of the long-term growth in our region, and we anticipate that recent statewide and regional initiatives to attract businesses and residents will spur a period of faster growth in the coming years. Consequently, Central Ohio is still on track to become a region of 3 million residents by 2050.

RESOLUTION 14-22

"Establishing population estimates as a basis for 2023 annual participation fees to be assessed members"

WHEREAS, MORPC staff has produced January 1, 2022 population estimates to provide a basis for local dues assessments, as per the Articles of Agreement; and

WHEREAS, 2023 participation fees are assessed at a rate of \$0.615 per capita for members within the federally declared Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) Transportation Study Area boundaries of MORPC, \$0.515 per capita for county members within the Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization (CORPO) boundaries, and \$0.410 for all other members, excluding associate members which are not assessed population-based fees, in accordance with Resolution 08-22; and

WHEREAS, \$0.07 per capita is earmarked exclusively for the MORPC building/reserve, in accordance with Resolution 08-22; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 08-22 adopts rates consistent with the five-year plan proposed in Resolution 09-21 and are below the "maximum per-capita membership fee" approved by the Commission in Resolution 09-21 on June 10, 2021; and

WHEREAS, Attachment 1 sets forth the population and dues assessments for MORPC members; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MID-OHIO REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION:

- Section 1. That the January 1, 2022 population estimates, as documented in the Attachment, are hereby adopted for the purpose of assessing 2023 participation fees, as listed in the Attachment.
- Section 2. That the executive director is authorized to take such other action and execute and deliver such other documents as, acting with the advice of legal counsel, he shall deem necessary and appropriate to carry out the intent of this resolution.
- Section 3. That this Commission finds and determines that all formal deliberations and actions of this Commission concerning and relating to the adoption of this resolution were taken in open meetings of this Commission.

Chair Erik Janas called the Transportation Policy Committee Meeting to order at 2:22 p.m.

Metropolitan Planning Organization Report

• Programming – Thea Ewing, MORPC Chief Regional Development Officer & Senior Director of Programming

Thea Ewing presented the <u>Metropolitan Planning Organization Report</u>. The ODOT Transportation Review Advisory Council (TRAC) received 31 applications to advance major capital projects. Six projects are from the MORPC MPO area requesting a total of \$306 million. The six projects went through the MORPC prioritization process based on goals from the long range transportation plan. The proposed prioritization is on today's consent agenda (Resolution T-11-22). Ms. Ewing will present the projects to ODOT on the TRAC hearing day.

MORPC is working with colleagues in Delaware, Morrow and Marion Counties and the Toledo region on the U.S. 23 Study. ODOT felt results of the first study exceeded the value of the return on investment. We continue to look at ways to improve connectivity between Toledo and Columbus. Toledo foresees additional freight opportunities

<u>Proposed Resolution T-9-22</u>: "Amending the 2020-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan" – Thea Ewing, MORPC Chief Regional Development Officer & Senior Director of Programming Thea Ewing presented the 2020-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan Amendment. The amendment is needed to include Intel-related projects. One comment was received from the Community Advisory Community asking that for future iterations of amendments for the Intel area, Board Members consider transit related projects for accessibility.

Greg Lestini made a motion to approve Resolution T-9-22, second by Pam Hykes O'Grady; motion passed.

<u>2024-2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan Update</u> – Thea Ewing, MORPC Chief Regional Development Officer & Senior Director of Programming

Each month this fall Mr. Murdock will highlight one of the pillars of MORPC's Strategic Framework. Today he is focusing on <u>Drive Investment: Retooling Our Approach</u>. The 2022 Strategic Framework Pillars are:

- Pay it Forward
- Create an Environment for Prosperity
- Build Value for Members
- Drive Investment

Due to historic federal investment, the Intel project, Investment in Appalachia, an employee departure, and feedback from members, we are realigning the drive investment pillar to make sure we are investing in the region's infrastructure. Earlier this year we hired a grants officer. That position has turned over and a lot has changed since then. The realignment provides more technical assistance to members and helps us be more proactive and strategic in competing for investment. Instead of replacing the Grants Officer, two new positions will be created. The Regional Investment Officer will serve under Government Affairs but work closely with the Development Team. The Regional Investment Officer is advocacy driven and will identify funding opportunities, provide targeted communications to members, etc. The Grants Coordinator will serve under Development and is technically driven providing technical skills, procuring services, etc. We also want to be aligned with the business community.

<u>Regional Data Advisory Committee</u> – Brad Ebersole (Delaware County), Regional Data Advisory Committee Chair

Brad Ebersole gave the <u>Regional Data Advisory Committee Update</u>. The mission of the Regional Data Advisory Committee (RDAC) advances data policies and strategic actions to increase access to open data in Central Ohio. RDAC has three working groups: Capacity Building and Partnerships, Local Government Resources, and Regional Municipal Fiber Strategy.

The Capacity Building and Partnerships Working Group is postponing Data Day in order to partner with Ohio University in March.

The Regional Municipal Fiber Strategy Working Group continues to work with the City of Columbus to strategically find ways to maximize the use of available federal funding in a way that can be advantageous to everyone in the region.

The Local Government Resources Working Group is creating a data governance resource library. The library is a hub for best practices, templates, reference materials, policy frameworks, etc. The resource hub and intake form will soon be available on MORPC's website. With Jung Kim leaving One Columbus and RDAC, we are excited to announce that Jay Knox, the Director of Client Research with One Columbus, has agreed to join us as a board member. <u>Regional Policy Roundtable</u> – David Scheffler (City of Lancaster), Regional Policy Roundtable Chair

David Scheffler presented the <u>Regional Policy Roundtable Update</u>. As stated previously, MORPC hosted the Candidates Forum in coordination with the Ohio Association of Regional Councils. It was an opportunity to hear both candidates answer the same questions. There were also several interesting and valuable panels on economic development.

The 2023-2024 Public Policy Agenda Working Group, chaired by Lourdes Barroso de Padilla, begins meeting next week. The agenda is a central document that states MORPC's state and federal policy for the next two years. The Working Group will meet three times over the next three months. SolSmart is a free technical assistance and designation program run by the U.S. Department of Energy that encourages local governments to promote solar energy growth by addressing soft cost barriers, focusing primarily on permitting & inspection, planning & zoning, government operations, and community engagement.  <u>Trail Town Update</u> – Kerstin Carr, MORPC Chief Regional Strategy Officer & Senior Director of Planning

Kerstin Carr provided an update on the <u>Trail Town Framework</u>. Over the past nine months, MORPC has worked with a team of consultants to develop a framework for a trail town designation program that will celebrate our trails and identify opportunities for economic and recreational development along the trails. Amy Camp is the main consultant. The consultants worked with four partners on the Ohio to Erie Trail (the Cities of London, Sunbury, Centerburg and Mount Vernon) to understand how residents, businesses and trail users feel about the trails and the towns. The consultants used the information gathered as a foundation to develop a blueprint to implement the regional designation program in which communities can apply to be part of a shared marketing and communications strategy encouraging trail use. The goal is to replicate the framework statewide. The full document will be available later this month on <u>centralohiogreenways.com</u>.

In the meantime, MORPC will continue to partner with stakeholders like Rails-to-Trails Conservancy and Experience Columbus on events and programs promoting/celebrating trails. The Columbus Foundation provided funding to continue the trail town work to bring it to the urban area and the Ohio Department of Transportation provided a \$200,000 grant to develop a regional wayfinding strategy.
