



MORPC-Attributable Funding

Approximately \$37 Million Annual Budget

- Surface Transportation Block Grant Program (STBG) ~\$23M/yr
- Congestion Mitigation/Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ) ~\$12M/yr
- Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP)
 ~\$2M/yr

Solicit Project Applications Every Two Years

- Updates to previous funding commitments
- Applications for new commitments



Policies Review

- Began May 2019 with AFC session to brainstorm changes
- Meetings September to December
 - Staff presented changes
 - AFC members discussed, commented, and directed

Policies Adopted in March



Changes for 2020



- Adjusting the schedule for the applications
- Providing additional data for which the evaluation of projects will be based on prior to the screening applications being due
- Example information for some open ended questions
- Incorporating language with regard to the new Smarts Streets Policy
- Clarifying language on who pays interest on SIB loans

Funding Management Process



Application Timeline 2020-21



- March: MORPC adopts Policies
- June 3: MORPC hosts applicant workshop, 2:30
- July 10: Commitment Update Form due
- July 17: Screening Applications for new funding due
- Early August: Staff completes review of Updates. Provide feedback to applicants and revised forecast of available funding
- October 9: Final Applications due
- November 4: Ad-interim AFC members change
- October January: Staff review and score applications & AFC review and recommends funding commitments
- February 2021: Draft list of funding commitments available for public review and comment
- May 2021: MORPC Adopts list of attributable funding commitments

Activity Categories

MORPC

- Major Widening/New Roadway
 - Add through lanes or new roadways
 - New or expanded interchanges
- Minor Widening/Intersections/Signals
 - Add center turn lane
 - Expand intersection capacity
 - Coordinated signal systems
- System Preservation
 - Replace existing infrastructure only
 - No capacity addition

Public Transit

- Replace vehicles
- Park & rides, transit centers
- Enhanced bus stops
- New service capital projects

Bike and Pedestrian

- Add path, bike lanes, sidewalks
- Not part of a larger project

Other

- Does not fit others categories
- Education & enforcement
- Engine retrofits, alternative fuels stations, etc.

- Identify best projects in each category
- Some criteria differ by category
- For FY 2022+

Major Requirements

- Public agencies only
- For capital (not operating)
- Roadways on federal-aid system
 - Bridges can be on any road
- In Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP)
 - Individually listed
 - Included in line item
- 20 percent cash match
- Preliminary engineering (PE) & design ineligible
- Project Development
 - Follow ODOT project development process
 - Complete Streets Policy
 - Smart Streets Policy
 - Formal updates every 2 years

Final Application

- Detailed scope, schedule, cost, etc.
 - Origin and planning to date of project
 - Expected environmental process path
 - How expected to comply with complete streets policy
 - Considerations for smarts streets policy
 - Engineer certified cost estimate
- Incorporate and respond to feedback
- Questions related to scoring
- Public agency authorization
 - Signature
 - Resolution





Evaluation Information

MORPC

- Questions reference project selection criteria for project categories
- Grouped by MTP goal
- Some questions do not apply to certain categories
- Feedback will give guidance for which questions need a response

MTP Goals (criteria areas)

- Attract and retain <u>economic opportunity</u>
- Preserve and protect <u>natural resources</u>
- Promote <u>energy</u> reduction & production of energy from renewable resources
- Increase <u>collaboration</u> to maximize return on public expenditures
- Promote public investments that benefit the health, safety and welfare of people
- Create <u>sustainable neighborhoods</u> to improve residents' quality of life

Project Scoring

- Evaluation criteria for each Activity Category
- Staff performs initial scoring
- Confirm Activity Category
- Quantitative and qualitative measures
- Scored on 10 point scale for each of 6 goals
 - Relative to applications in its category
 - Brief rationale for each score
- Policies show questions used for each criterion
- Weights applied to score for each goal
- Weights differ by Activity Category
- Penalties for missing items, not responding to requests



AFC Review & Recommendation

- Reviews scoring & ranking
- Determines best applications by category
- Recommends a program of commitments within targets by category




WHAT IS THE METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION PLAN (MTP)?

- Formal document submitted to ODOT and USDOT every 4 years




DEVELOPMENT TIMELINE



2020-2050 COLUMBUS AREA METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION PLAN



SYSTEM DEVELOPMENT

- Transit \$12.9 billion
 - Five high-capacity transit projects covering 36 miles
 - Maintain and expand COTA and DCT service
 - Replacement vehicles and other capital expenses

Bicycle & Pedestrian - \$830 million

• 415 miles of stand-alone bike and/or pedestrian facilities

Freeways - \$3.6 billion

- 26 miles of freeways widened
- 17 miles of four-lane divided roadways converted to freeways
- 42 miles with lane management along freeways
- 25 interchange modifications
- 6 new interchanges

Non-Freeway Roadways - \$4 billion

- 100 miles of new roadway connections
- 86 miles with through lane additions
- 119 miles with minor widening/safety improvements
- 152 intersections modifications




2020-2050 COLUMBUS AREA METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION PLAN

- Assumes modest growth of current funding levels with some new funding in the region




2020-2050 COLUMBUS AREA METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION PLAN








BUILD OFF OF THE BIKING MOMENTUM



- More people are biking around the country
 - New York saw a 52% spike
 - Chicago bike share doubled in early May
- Alternative for people who depend on transit
- Mobility option for essential workers
- Meet recommended physical activity guidelines
 - Reduce Stress
 - Support immune system



WHAT DOES THE FUTURE LOOK LIKE?

BIKE MONTH(S)

MORPC

- Normally: try it out, make it a habit
- Now: dust off your bike, go for a ride
 - Expanded target audience: interested but concerned + the bygone strong and fearless parents who stopped riding when they had kids
 - Practical ideas
 - Educational videos
 - Live demos, classes, Q+As (bike commuting 101, fix it classes, etc.)
 - Mobile bike repair or shop visits
 - Special newsletters
 - Push bike media, like documentaries
- Developing a new habit takes work and dedication
 - On average, it takes more than 2 months before a new behavior becomes automatic
 - Practical ideas
 - Test ride to work
 - Solo challenges
 - Make it an adventure or mission (support local businesses, city nature challenge, geocaching, bingo card)
 - Ride with kids
 - Offer advanced EDU (how to ride in the rain, how to track rides, how to bike to work)

We want those that took up biking during the pandemic to stick with it!



CENTRAL OHIO COMMUTER CHALLENGE



- Take advantage of weather messaging
- Connection to COTA campaign
- Different tone than previous Commuter Challenged
 - Comfort and encouragement
 - More of a push of intrinsic values
- More to come!




