208 Planning and Areawide Designation Process

The 208 committee continues to review and provide input on key decisions, such as the operational structure and funding considerations for standing up a designated areawide planning agency. MORPC anticipates completing these initial steps for establishing an Areawide Planning Agency in the first quarter of 2025 for Board consideration. Following approval, MORPC will work with the Ohio EPA to conduct a public engagement process with affected stakeholders.

Regional Water Study

The Central Ohio Regional Water Study consultants requested an extension through February to complete the Water Study. The delay is due to significant modeling efforts to account for numerous growth and weather scenarios over the next few decades. Transportation Safety

MORPC hosted a Steering Committee meeting that formally kicked off ODOT's 2025 update to the Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP). Working Groups will meet throughout 2025 to update each of the Emphasis Area action plans. The plan establishes Ohio's safety priorities and what is eligible for highway safety funding in Ohio.

Gohio Commute

Commute Perks was added to Gohio Commute. The new program provides Ohio commuters the opportunity to earn discounts at local and national retailers for logging five days of eligible commutes to work per month. Team Members are reaching out to local employers to introduce the new program to their employees.

MORPC participated in a workforce transportation event at the Fairfield County Workforce Center that focused on workforce mobility options in Fairfield County.

Active Transportation Planning

The Active Transportation Committee met January 29. Meeting materials are available <u>here</u>. The next meeting is April 23.

Team Members completed two Complete Streets reviews and provided relevant comments for PID 119514 Ferris Rd – Stage 1 plans and PID 112127 FRA Emerald Connector – Stage 1 plans.

MORPC is collaborating with an OSU City and Regional Planning studio on an Active Transportation and Placemaking project. Staff attended a studio class on January 10 to present information on the topic and provide guidance for their semester-long project. The project goal is to develop an Active Transportation and Placemaking toolkit for communities in Central Ohio to use to enhance their infrastructure investments.

Technical Assistance Program

MORPC finalized scope documents and signed MOUs with the four 2025 Technical Assistance Program awardees. Team Members are working to launch a Technical Assistance (TA) Program dashboard that will highlight the TA program services completed since the program's inception.

Central Ohio Greenways (COG)

The COG Board met January 15 to review and adopt approximately 250 new proposed trail miles to the COG Vision. In March, the COG Board will welcome new COG Board Members and set goals for the next two years.

 The COG Trail Towns Working Group is developing a brand for the program in partnership with Experience Columbus. The Outdoor Trails Pass partnership with Experience Columbus continues to be a popular program with hundreds of new sign-ups and check-ins monthly.

MORPC is offering support to communities interested in implementing the COG Wayfinding Strategy through the MORPC Technical Assistance Program. The City of Hilliard is the first community to be awarded this support.

The Greenways Planning Studio (GPS) is crafting COG Forums for 2025. GPS is developing a strategic plan to leverage existing MORPC and partner resources and is working with RAPID 5 on grant strategies.

Central Ohio Blueways

Central Ohio Blueways Working Groups continue to prioritize and define their 2025 goals. The Environmental Stewardship Working Group is focusing on assembling guidance for Onion Bag Project Installations. The User Experience Working Group continues to advance the formation of a hazard removal consortium. The Water Trail Designation Working Group is refining an editable field map to distribute to communities along the waterways so they can provide details on amenities at access points, and any useful information on the waterways' navigability and seasonality.

Regional Housing Strategy

Team Members continue having conversations around housing issues with MORPC member communities. Staff continues to promote the identification of barriers and solutions related to housing for members through connections with MORPC's Community Assistance Programs and by giving presentations to councils and other organizations. Team Members continue to identify ways to expand upon the previous work of the regional Housing Strategy.

If you are interested in a housing/growth workshop for your community's elected officials, staff, or community leaders, MORPC is accepting requests for presentations and workshops. Sustainability Advisory Committee (SAC)

The next Sustainability Advisory Committee meeting is March 19 at the City of Grandview Heights Parks Building. MORPC Staff is wrapping up the member appointment process and will announce new members soon. For more information, contact Brandi Whetstone at bwhetstone@morpc.org.

 The Regional Sustainability Agenda Subcommittee met January 23 and provided input on proposed Goal 1 strategies. Subcommittee Members will review Goals 2 and 3 strategies for the next meeting. MORPC Team Members presented feedback from the SAC and proposed an updated timeline to account for the time required to review over 100 strategies. MORPC anticipates sharing the draft agenda in April and plans to host information sessions with key stakeholders. The next subcommittee meeting is February 19. Sustainable2050

Sustainable2050 met December 5 and included updates on the Regional Sustainability Agenda and a presentation from Jennie McAdams, Franklin County Public Health, and John Bowers, City of Columbus Recreation and Parks, about a recent countywide tree canopy study.

Sustainable2050 membership is open to all MORPC members, and current Sustainable2050 members interested in earning their tier status certification should contact Brandi Whetstone (bwhetstone@morpc.org). A certification workbook will be provided, and a kick-off meeting is encouraged to review the process. Once a completed workbook is submitted and reviewed, the next step is to present the proposed certification to the SAC for approval.

Sustaining Scioto Board

The Sustaining Scioto Board met December 11 and discussed the board's transition to a Regional Water Advisory Council. The proposed Regional Water Advisory Council will continue to advance broad regional water priorities including sustainable water resource management, climate resiliency, and adaptation in the face of growth, development, and changing weather patterns.

Energy & Air Quality

The next Energy and Air Quality Working Group meeting is February 26 and will discuss the year ahead and how to be active in energy and air quality within your community. If interested, contact Brian Filiatraut (bfiliatraut@morpc.org).

MORPC selected Heartland Charging Services to assist with executing the scope of work of its \$2 million U.S. DOT-FHWA Electric Vehicle Charger Reliability and Accessibility Accelerator (EVC RAA) award to repair and or replace non-operational EV chargers throughout the 15-county region.

Team Members are waiting to finalize the grant agreement with FHWA on its \$15 million MORE EVS project award to install over 400 EV charging ports in 13 counties as part of the U.S. DOT-FHWA's Charging and Fueling Infrastructure (CFI) Round 1B Program.

The core project team led by Sustainable Columbus, MORPC, and others continue to flesh out the next deliverables of the Central Ohio Climate Action Plan (COCAP) for the ten-county Columbus MSA. Power a Clean Future Ohio is conducting the greenhouse gas (GHG) reduction targets, the GHG emissions projections from the regional GHG inventory that MORPC completed, and the GHG measure quantification. Sustainable Columbus is leading the GHG measure selection, which are the strategies that will reduce pollution and serve as a roadmap for the Columbus MSA. Later this month, MORPC will host the next CPRG Strategy Subcommittee meeting to help provide input and refine those mitigation measures. Neighborhood Air Monitoring Project/U.S. EPA Project

Team Members, in partnership with Franklin County Public Health, made great progress on the U.S. EPA funded air monitoring project. Under the advisement of the air quality modeling consultant, Ramboll Americas Engineering Solutions, MORPC created an interactive map of where sensors should be deployed and began sharing this with local community partners. MORPC extended the deadline for sensor deployment to January 31 to ensure the best possible placements for analyzing local PM2.5 levels within Franklin County. Thirty-five new sensors were placed by the end of January with the project data collection period beginning in February.

Regional Data Advisory Committee (RDAC)

The RDAC met January 7 and continues to focus on a number of areas through the working groups noted below. The Leaders Listen Survey on Economic Development closed January 8. Results will be released at MORPC's State of the Region on March 21.

- Cyber Security Working Group: The Working Group conducted intake calls with four MORPC member communities and one community stakeholder signed up to engage with the Working Group for assistance in advancing their cybersecurity objectives. Interested parties should complete a Cybersecurity Working Group Interest Form. The group met January 28 to discuss next steps in providing MORPC member support.
- Data Day Working Group: The Working Group finalized plans for Data Day 2025 and is beginning plans for Data Day 2026. Send 2026 themes and speaker suggestions or improvement suggestions to Jordan Inskeep at jinskeep@morpc.org.

- D E I & Data Working Group: The Working Group met January 15 to review progress and offer support needed for the group's session proposals which were accepted for Data Day 2025. The group also discussed strategies for addressing additional objectives within the "Expand & Include" goal of the Regional Data Agenda through various potential projects in Q2 of 2025 and beyond.
- Regional Data Coaching Working Group: The Working Group met January 9 and 30 and discussed community outreach plans for 2025. The group plans to launch two distinct Office 365 groups, "Regional Data Coaches" and "Regional GIS Coaches," at Data Day. The group hosted the second pop-up event at the Columbus Metropolitan Library-main branch on December 7, 2024.
- Workforce and Job Quality Working Group: The Working Group met January 16 and worked to better specify the target output and audience. Members are currently developing a statement of principles and a series of fact sheets related to specific job quality standards, which are intended to be tailored to organizations that engage with regional employers, including but not limited to local governments and workforce development boards. The group is participating in the implementation phase of the Results for America Job Quality Fellowship and three Group Members will join other fellowship participants at a conference in February to get feedback on ideas and learn from teams who are further along in their job quality efforts.
- Central Ohio GIS User Group: The next Central Ohio GIS User Group meeting is February 26.
- Regional Information & Data Group (RIDG): At the January 7 RDAC meeting, members decided to
 update the RIDG charter and formality of the Steering Committee and Chair. After the next RIDG
 meeting on February 12, RIDG will begin to operate similarly to the Central Ohio GIS User Group.
 The RIDG Steering Committee and MORPC are working to develop topics for 2025. MORPC and
 Steering Committee members are evaluating the structure and charter of the Committee to assess
 areas for improvement and streamlining.

Data & Research Activities

Team Members continue to develop the MORPC Insights platform. Insights is a web application whose purpose is to provide data-derived insights on various topics at the regional, county, and community levels. Each insight will be supported by data, visualizations and expert commentary. The platform is expected to feature content from trusted partners in addition to MORPC-produced content. MORPC completed development of the user interface for the platform and is preparing content for the initial set of insights. The first set of insights are expected to be released by the end of February.

Team Members are collaborating with a group of graduate students in The Ohio State University Master of Translational Data Analytics program to conduct a property tax productivity analysis (aka "value per acre") for parcels in Delaware County. Past studies in other locations revealed that traditional walkable neighborhoods characteristic of those built prior to World War II produce significantly more tax value per acre than automobile-oriented development characteristic of post-WWII development patterns. The students recently completed the first semester of the two-semester course, in which they completed analysis planning and exploration data analysis. The students are carrying out the analysis under supervision from MORPC Staff. A key project goal is that the analysis will be reproducible and easily adaptable to other counties. The processes for working with county parcel data may also facilitate other critical MORPC work including subcounty population estimate.

DRIVE INVESTMENT

Transportation Review Advisory Council (TRAC)

At their January meeting, TRAC discussed increased costs for four projects in the MPO area. TRAC is expected to vote on additional funding for these projects at their February 26 meeting. TRAC continues to evaluate applications for the 2026-2029 program. A draft program is scheduled to be approved for public comment at TRAC's March 26 meeting.

Passenger Rail

Step 1 activities to develop a scope, schedule, and budget for passenger rail service development planning is ongoing, with draft deliverables to be submitted to the Federal Railroad Administration this month.

The next Central Ohio Passenger Rail Committee meeting is March 11.

Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS)/Economic Development District
MORPC launched the Leaders Listen – Economic Development Survey in December. Promoted by
MORPC and Columbus Dispatch across print and digital channels, this year's survey focused on Central
Ohio residents' thoughts on the region's economic growth and development. The survey results are being
analyzed.

Freight Planning

MORPC, in partnership with ODOT, hosted the Rickenbacker Area Freight Alliance Workshop on December 16. The event brought together representatives from the Columbus Regional Logistics Council, the Central Ohio Transit Authority, the Columbus Regional Airport Authority, the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT), One Columbus, and other key stakeholders from the Rickenbacker area. The event was an opportunity for stakeholders to provide project updates and share the challenges they face. Key findings will help set MORPC's priorities for freight planning in that area.

Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP)

Team Members ensured work on the draft Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) development was consistent with the 2024-2050 MTP.

Competitive Advantage Projects (CAP)

The relaunch of the Competitive Advantage Projects (CAP) program is on hold until federal funding priorities, particularly those of the U.S. Economic Development Administration, are clear.

Federal Competitive Programs

The United States Department of Transportation (U.S. DOT) announced the Round 1 awards for the Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) program in January. While MORPC's Trail Towns in the Nation's Heartland proposal was not selected for funding, both the City of Columbus and the City of Lancaster obtained an award for their respective projects.

The City of Circleville and Delaware County each partnered with the Ohio Rail Development Commission to submit two separate applications under U.S. DOT's Railroad Crossing Elimination program. Delaware County's application will eliminate one at-grade railroad crossing on East Orange Road and replace it with a rail-over grade separation. Circleville's application will replace an at-grade crossing with a grade separation. Both applications were approved for funding.

The U.S. DOT closed its Regional Infrastructure Accelerators (RIA) program on January 9. MORPC submitted a proposal titled "Connecting the Heartland: Revitalizing Rural Communities through Trail Development," requesting \$1 million in federal funding. The funding will enable MORPC to provide partnership development, innovative financing strategies, and innovative project delivery for rural trail projects.

MORPC established a process for Letters of Support requests. The process not only helps Central Ohio communities and other partners receive MORPC's support letters in a timely manner but also helps track and record internally the letters provided for different funding opportunities. MORPC submitted a grant application to the Ohio Department of Transportation for Mobility Management planning activities and the Regional Mobility Plan rewrite.

Team Members are collaborating with the Village of Minerva Park to determine an appropriate strategy and assist with their Safe Routes to School grant application. Safe Routes to School funding applications (for infrastructure, non-infrastructure, or consultant assistance to develop/update School Travel Plans) are due by March 7.

Drive Investment Portal

The Drive Investment Portal is a free member resource with up-to-date information on active and proposed funding opportunities to help finance regional priorities. For questions, contact Preston Frick at pfrick@morpc.org.

<u>LinkUS</u>

MORPC continues to work with COTA and local partners to develop and finalize initial funding agreements for transit-supportive infrastructure projects over the next several months.

Mobility Management

The Central Ohio Mobility Management Working Group met January 15. Mobility managers from Delaware, Fairfield, Fayette, Franklin, Licking, Logan, Madison, Pickaway, and Union Counties discussed county transportation updates and plans for Ohio Loves Transit Week/Day.

FTA Section 5310 Designated Recipient

The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) approved FY2024 Section 5310 funding selections in January. Team Members notified applicants of the status of their request. Team Members will finalize funding agreements in the coming weeks.

Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization (CORPO)

CORPO submitted the first draft of the SFY 26-29 Transportation Improvement Program at the end of January for review by ODOT.

CORPO Team Members are preparing data and supporting materials needed to complete the Functional Classification Review process, then will coordinate with CORPO counties on draft revisions to functional classification. The full review is due by August 2025.

The next round of CORPO County Subcommittee Meetings are the last two weeks of March.

<u>Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)</u>

MORPC submitted the first draft of the SFY 26-29 TIP at the end of January for review by ODOT, the Federal Highway Administration and the Federal Transit Administration.

MORPC-Attributable Funding

A public comment period on the draft funding recommendations approved by the Attributable Funds Committee began in January and remains open through February 12.

Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC)

Final ranking slates for SFY 26 SCIP/LTIP funding for District 3 (Franklin County) were approved in December and transmitted to OPWC.

Clean Ohio Conservation Fund

The District 3 (Franklin County) Natural Resource Assistance Council meets on March 20 to approve the methodology and schedule for Fiscal Year 2026. District 3 has approximately \$3.5 million available in the upcoming cycle.

In December, the Commission approved MORPC to provide liaison and administrative services to District 17 (Delaware, Pickaway, Fairfield, Knox, Licking and Morrow Counties). The District 17 Natural Resources Assistance Council met January 17 to approve the schedule, workplan and methodology for FY 26. The district has approximately \$2.5 million available in the FY 26 cycle. Final applications are due September 19.

STEPZ Workshop

<u>Meeting Called to Order</u> – Chris Amorose Groomes (City of Dublin), MORPC Chair Chair Chris Amorose Groomes called the Transportation Policy Committee Meeting to order at 2:34 p.m.

<u>Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) Report</u> – Parag Agrawal, MORPC Chief Mobility & Infrastructure Officer & Senior Director of Programming

Parag Agrawal presented the <u>Metropolitan Planning Organization Report</u>. Mr. Agrawal noted the resolutions on the consent agendas.

- Resolution T-13-24 is the regular quarterly Transportation Improvement Program amendment. It represents an addition of \$55.5 million in new transportation funding.
- Resolution T-14-24 supporting ODOT's 2025 safety performance measure targets, calls for a
 two percent annual reduction for each of the five safety measures (number of fatalities,
 fatality rates, number of injuries, serious injury rates, number of non-motorized fatalities and
 serious injuries).
- Resolution 23-24 authorizes the executive director to accept the \$1.4 million grant awarded to MORPC last week for the Prioritization Process Pilot Program.
- Resolution 24-24 authorizes the executive director to accept the \$2.11 million awarded to MORPC a couple of months ago for the Safe Streets and Roads for All program.
- Resolution 29-24 is required for a grant application for the regional mobility plan. The grant application is due December 31.

MORPC received 18 applications (37 different projects) for the Federal Transit Administration Section 5310 funding. There is \$1.7 million available this round. The Review Committee and Staff recommend funding 18 projects from 15 different applications.

The Technical Assistance Program works with member communities to enhance bike and pedestrian facilities. In 2025, MORPC will be working with the Village of Galena, the City of Hilliard, the City of Gahanna, and the City of Grove City.

Earlier this year, MORPC submitted a RAISE grant application for Trail Towns in the Nation's Heartland. While not awarded, the application was named a project of merit. We resubmitted the application December 2 and are expecting the award announcement in January 2025.

MORPC received a \$1.4 million award from U.S. DOT for the Prioritization Process Pilot Program (PPPP) for Sustainable Transportation Development. Our application, Building Equitable and Safe Transportation (BEST) will help us reinvent the Metropolitan Transportation Plan process to enhance the plan and incorporate safety and economic development in the evaluation process.

MORPC is working with the Ohio Department of Transportation on the December 16 Rickenbacker Freight Alliance Workshop to look at economic development and transportation investments in the Rickenbacker area.

The November 21 Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) Committee meeting featured the City of Hilliard City Lab.

MORPC continues to work with partners at the state and local levels in Indiana and Pennsylvania to manage the Midwest Connect Corridor Project. Stage one will be completed early next year. We expect to get approval from the Federal Railroad Administration by spring 2025. Stage two includes station area planning, passenger rail frequency, and funding required for infrastructure improvements. MORPC continues to coordinate the planning process with external stakeholders

such as Amtrak, the Ohio Rail Development Commission, and the Indiana and Pennsylvania Departments of Transportation.

Resolution T-1-25 amends the SFY 2025 Planning Work Program (PWP) to add one new work element and a budget modification for another.

This resolution adds 66516-3000 Prioritization Process Pilot Program. MORPC was awarded funds to complete this activity upon a successful application to U.S. DOT's Prioritization Process Pilot Program in 2024. This activity will conduct a comprehensive review and revision of MORPC's project prioritization and selection process for inclusion in the Metropolitan Transportation Plan. The purpose of this activity is to create a publicly transparent project prioritization process which emphasizes safety and equity when selecting projects.

An additional \$2,650,000 is being added to the budget of 66584-3000 - Safe Streets For All Action Plan and Demonstration Activities. In 2023, MORPC applied to U.S. DOT's Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) discretionary grant program for safety planning funds. In December 2023, MORPC received notification of the award, which was included in the FY 25 PWP. In 2024, MORPC, in partnership with The Ohio State University, applied to SS4A and was awarded funding for a separate activity of crash analytics and injury research. The additional funding amount being added to the budget of 66584-3000 is to account for this funding award and work activity.

Meeting Called to Order - Chris Amorose Groomes (City of Dublin), MORPC Chair

Chair Chris Amorose Groomes called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m. followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

<u>Recognition of Guests and New Members</u> – Eileen Leuby, MORPC Membership Services Officer

Eileen Leuby welcomed City of Marion Director of Public Service and Commission Representative Michael Bodine and City of Marion Grant Writer Zoe Brown. Ms. Leuby welcomed Village of Alexandria Representative Sean Barnes who is attending remotely.

Executive Director's Report - William Murdock, MORPC Executive Director

William Murdock gave the <u>Executive's Director Report</u>. Mr. Murdock welcomed the new members and thanked the MORPC Team for organizing the 90-member celebration held before the Commission meeting.

Mr. Murdock reminded Commission members that one of MORPC's core values is driving investment. Just in transportation this past year, we received five federal infrastructure grants totaling \$21 million. Last week we learned MORPC received a \$1.4 million award from U.S. DOT for the Prioritization Process Pilot Program (PPPP) for Sustainable Transportation Development to enhance and improve the planning process for the Metropolitan Transportation Plan. We are the only entity in the Midwest to receive one of these grants.

Mr. Murdock congratulated the John Glenn Columbus International Airport for breaking ground on their new terminal earlier this week. He congratulated the City of Columbus on passage of their Bike Plus Plan.

Mr. Murdock announced that MORPC's HR Director Andrea Doolittle is retiring at the end of the year. We will miss her.

The Columbus Partnership named Jason Hall as their new CEO. Mr. Murdock met with him this morning.

Mr. Murdock noted that, as with any new federal administration and the resulting transition in agencies and policies, there could be delays, changes, or slowdowns and that MORPC is proactively working to navigate this environment. The Commission Consent Agenda includes potential grants that could happen in the next couple months, and we want to be able to move if we receive those grants. We have not received word of receiving any of the potential grants.

A lot has been going on in regional housing since the Commission last met. A number of communities stood up a Regional Housing Collaborative. MORPC talked with the consultant and is trying to help them get information. They are also asking for communities that want to be involved. If interested, contact the City of Columbus or MORPC. Mr. Murdock shared other efforts MORPC is doing in the area of housing which include policy advocacy, the CURA webinar series with OSU, leading the National Association of Regional Councils group on regional housing strategies, working with OSU's Glenn College on housing policy briefs, working with Delaware County, and the rural forums.

Mr. Murdock asked members to help get the word out about MORPC's weatherization program. Weatherizing and stabilizing a home actually saves two homes. For those outside Franklin County, MORPC can connect you with the appropriate agencies. MORPC is assertive in marketing the program to engage and find clients. Mr. Murdock shared the link to the newest <u>commercial</u>.

Mr. Murdock congratulated partners at MODE and One Columbus for the excellent ED 411 event. MORPC is proud to partner with ED 411. The Economic Development Administration reauthorization may happen. If so, that provides more resources for communities and gives MORPC the ability to provide technical assistance.

The 208 Process Review Committee met this morning. Mr. Murdock thanked those serving on the committee that is positioning the region to navigate the issue of providing sewer to the growing region. The committee hopes to bring recommendations to the Commission to consider in the first quarter of 2025.

Preliminary findings of the Regional Water Study will start coming out in the next few weeks and the final findings will be issued in February or March 2025. The study touches all counties in MORPC's region.

The next Leaders Listen Survey, in partnership with The Columbus Dispatch, opens today at 4 p.m. The survey focuses on economic development and is available at <u>Leaders Listen Survey Series</u> — <u>MORPC.org.</u>

The Member Benefit of the Month is the Annual Member Visit with the Executive Director and Member Services. MORPC tries to visit every community every year. Mr. Murdock thanked the communities for meeting with us.

The Grant of the Month is the ODOT Pedestrian & Bicycle Special Solicitation for projects that make walking and biking a safe, convenient, and accessible transportation option. The second cycle opens January 1, 2025.

Registration for Governing Essentials for Local Elected Officials begins January 2025. The program begins February 28, 2025. This is a great opportunity for any elected official, but especially newly elected officials.

Registration is open for Data Day 2025, February 5 at the Columbus State Community College Workforce Development Center.

The Northwest Area Regional Planning Luncheon is January 22, 2025 in Plain City.

<u>Registration</u> is open for the March 21, 2025 State of the Region. Mr. Murdock encouraged members to nominate regional leaders for the upcoming State of the Region awards.

navigating the complicated and diverse funding sources. While taking into account major opportunities in a growing region, the focus of MORPC's budget is to:

- Advance the Strategic Framework
- Be assertive in uncertain times
- Enhance the MORPC Team
- Strengthen operations, reporting and finances

Mr. Murdock shared priority initiatives for each pillar of the Strategic Framework.

Mr. Hufstedler gave an overview of the 2025 Budget Book included in the meeting packet. He recognized and thanked Steve Armstrong, Alisa Obukhova, and Besty Hunkar for their work on putting together the budget. He thanked Mr. Murdock for his guidance and support. The Department Heads were also a great help.

The overall budget is \$30 million (up \$6.8 million from last year) with federal funding as the largest revenue source. The first three columns on the 5-year revenue comparison chart are actual figures while the last two columns are budget figures. The actual figures are noticeably less than the budget columns. This is expected and consistent with our budget approach of budgeting on the high end of what we might do in a calendar year. We are more than 90 percent grant funded; most of the grants are on a reimbursement basis.

Salaries/benefits and subcontractor expenses combined account for 75 percent of operating uses. The increase in staff salaries and benefits is due to an increase in FTE's, wage increases across the board, a few promotions and wage adjustments, and salary enhancements. The combined fringe and indirect rates are flat.

The \$90,000 increase in member dues is due to acceptance of new members, population changes, and dues rate increases.

If transfers are needed, they will be consistent with our operating reserve policy.

Matthew Starr made a motion to approve Resolution 17-24, second by LaGrieta Acheampong; motion passed.

<u>Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization</u> – Brian Ball (City of Mount Vernon), Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization Vice Chair

Brian Ball presented the <u>Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization Report</u>. Mr. Ball announced the Central Ohio Rural Planning Organization (CORPO) has new leadership. The Chair is Jeff Stauch, Union County Engineer. The Vice Chair is Brian Ball, City of Mount Vernon Engineer.

CORPO is working toward a Bylaws update to align with ODOT and the regulations of regional transportation organizations. They are also emphasizing the importance of representatives attending the meetings so they can have a quorum and do business.

The CORPO Safety Action Plan is finalized and available <u>online</u>. The plan established a goal of two percent annual reduction in crashes. With the plan in place, each CORPO community can ask for federal money to implement projects.

<u>Regional Policy Roundtable</u> – Joseph Garrity, MORPC Senior Director of Government Affairs & Community Relations

• Proposed Resolution 18-24: "Adoption of MORPC's 2025-2026 Public Policy Agenda"

Joe Garrity presented a Review of the 2025-2026 Public Policy Agenda and the Regional Policy Roundtable Update. Mr. Garrity thanked City of New Albany Mayor Sloan Spalding for leading the collaborative effort to focus on how to best advocate on behalf of 90 different local governments at the state and federal levels. Our advocacy is structured in two ways: lead goals and collaborative goals. The key changes from the last Public Policy Agenda include integrating the data and digital infrastructure lead goal into regionalism; aligning the goals with the Strategic Framework and department names; and emphasizing protection of federal investments.

Mr. Garrity thanked Kyle Probert for coordinating the working group meetings and making certain language was consistent in crafting the agenda.

Brad Ebersole made a motion to approve Resolution 18-24, second by Heidi Munc; motion passed.

Jo Ingles from the Ohio News Bureau gave a political analysis and update following the November election at the last Roundtable Meeting. The next Regional Policy Roundtable meeting is February 18, 2025.

MORPC Team Members will produce a finalized document of the 2025-2026 Public Policy Agenda in time for the February 2025 National Association of Regional Councils Conference and congressional visits in Washington, DC.

Ben Kessler presented the <u>Sustainability Advisory Committee Report</u>. Every four years MORPC revises the Regional Sustainability Agenda (RSA). A subcommittee with broad regional representation is working on the 2025-2028 RSA. Mayor Kessler thanked subcommittee members for lending their expertise. The subcommittee anticipates presenting the updated RSA to the Commission for adoption in April 2025.

MORPC announced the 2025 Clean Ohio Conservation Program projects awarded in Franklin County. The grants, provided by the Ohio Public Works Commission, support the preservation of green space and the protection of waterways in the region.

The District 3 Natural Resources Assistance Council (NRAC) is seeking nominations to fill three vacancies on its Council. The vacancies must include representatives from the following categories:

Jessica Kuenzli shared information on the Clean Ohio Administrative Services Request.

Since 2014, MORPC has provided administrative and liaison support for District 3 which covers Franklin County. MORPC was asked by the Natural Resources Assistance Council in District 17 to assume administrative and liaison roles for the district for FY 2026. District 17 covers Delaware, Fairfield, Knox, Licking, Morrow, and Pickaway Counties. Districts 3 and 17 are the only districts fully contained in MORPC's area. We do not need to hire additional staff. Licking County served as the previous liaison but stepped down due to staffing issues.
